Besides "the daily round" there were regular visits made and teaching done by Mrs. Marsh amongst the houses and tepees, two or three times weekly, from which she derived much happiness, as the people 9-1v appreciated her visits and seemed to take much pleasure out of them and we earnestly trust were blessed to them spiritually as well.

My sister's day school and soup kitchen was another feature in the work and one that was undoubtedly a great blessing to the people, both young and old. Every day she would prepare a midday meal for the pupils in her class and only those who had come in time to receive their two hours of instruction were entitled to receive of her bounty. It is unnecessary to say, that, generally speaking, it was only those whom absolute necessity kept away that did not avail themselves of the opportunity of at least one square meal a day. 




