Letter From Mr. Thos. J. Marsh
St. Peter's Mission, Hay River, Nov. 15th, 1898.
(Continued from last week.)

September the 1st brought us a return of some of our old Khondjko friends and two of them, Messrs. Clark & Wilson, who had wintered here last year, decided to stop over and help us until sometime in the early spring. I am glad to be able to say that these are men of whose Christian character and sterling worth there is no doubt, and whose influence amongst our people is only for the good, and thus you see again God's providential care is ever over us and although He had taken away two of our helpers in the summer He still supplied us in the time of our dire need, and so we learn to trust Him even when we cannot see.

The middle of this month saw us taking up our abode for the first time in our new addition to our buildings. It was not one day before we were absolutely needed it, for even now we have no room to waste, although it has greatly improved our accommodation. The 17th brought us our year's supplies and the bales so kindly donated by our friends of the W. A., and thus ends a long list of the events of the year and now we are comfortably settled and ready to enter upon another winter with plenty of provisions for the next four or five months, having grown three hundred and twenty-five bushels of potatoes on the Mission premises and made a catch of twelve thousand fish this fall.

And now I may mention some of the special work carried on. Besides "the daily round" there were regular visits made and teaching done by Mrs. Marsh amongst the houses and tents, two or three times weekly, from which she derived much happiness, as the people appreciated her visits and seemed to take much pleasure out of them and we earnestly trust were blessed to them spiritually as well.

My sister's day school and soup kitchen was another feature in the work, and one that was undoubtedly a great blessing to the people, both young and old. Every day she would prepare a midday meal for the pupils in her class and only those who had come in time to receive their two hours of instruction were entitled to receive of her bounty. It is unnecessary to say, that, generally speaking, it was only those whom absolute necessity kept away that did not avail themselves of the opportunity of at least one square meal a day. By this means, almost every woman and child in our settlement, was taught to read the "Message of Peace" in their own language, and many of the simpler truths regarding God's way of salvation. It was touching to watch some of these little ones, as they stood at my sister's knee and sang of the Saviour's love, or listened the Ten Commandments, (in brief), or the Lord's prayer in their own tongue. These, my sister, in blessing them, with their affections and so often now they ask and long for her safe and speedy return to their midst, in health and strength.

The next in order was Miss Tim's night school for the young men of this place, who gathered about her faithfully from night to night throughout the long winter, that they might learn to read in the English language, and many a good lesson of truth did she teach them as the months went by. In this good work she was greatly assisted by Mr. Christie. She also spent a happy hour once a week amongst the Indian houses, teaching the word of God to those who gathered from time to time. Since my sister left, however, all this extra teaching has had to be dropped, and Miss Tim's finds her time more than fully occupied with household cares and looking after the clothing of our big family of little ones.

Another most encouraging feature of the work has been the starting of a large Sunday school class for the Indian speaking children of both the school and village by Mrs. Marsh's trusted helper, Miss Christie McSwain, who being of country birth and advantage on her mother's side, has the advantage of a perfect knowledge of the native tongue and who has developed into an earnest christian character.
Another thing for which we have great cause to be thankful is the high moral character, christian integrity and uprightness of our male Half-breed helper and interpreter, Charles Now, whose influence amongst the Indians is for right, an almost phenomenal case.

As for my own work, it has followed much in the usual order. Sundays are always busy days, having services in both Indian and English, which, when following closely upon week days full of manual labor, often prove days of real weariness, and yet full of blessings, whilst one of our most happy seasons was our weekly hour united Bible study each Thursday evening. Now that my sister has gone, and our school has so increased in numbers, it has fallen to my lot to do most of the teaching and leave the manual labor for the lay helpers, of which there has always been somewhat of a dearth until this year. On looking over the whole year I cannot but feel that God has blessed and honored our feeblest efforts, no matter how desiring but far beyond our fondest hopes for all of which we thank and praise Him. In concluding this part of my resume of our work, I feel in duty bound to say, that God's goodness has so willed it, that I have found myself surrounded with a band of co-workers, with one and all of whom, I may well deem it an honor and a privilege to have been associated, and of whose faithfulness and unselfish devotion to the cause of Christ, it would be impossible for me to speak in too glowing terms.

With such a catalogue of blessings, it would almost seem as though we could not possibly have any needs and yet we do! If our work is to continue and grow, we must have more helpers in it, both male and female, and that right soon. Thy rest, thy joy, thy glory share.

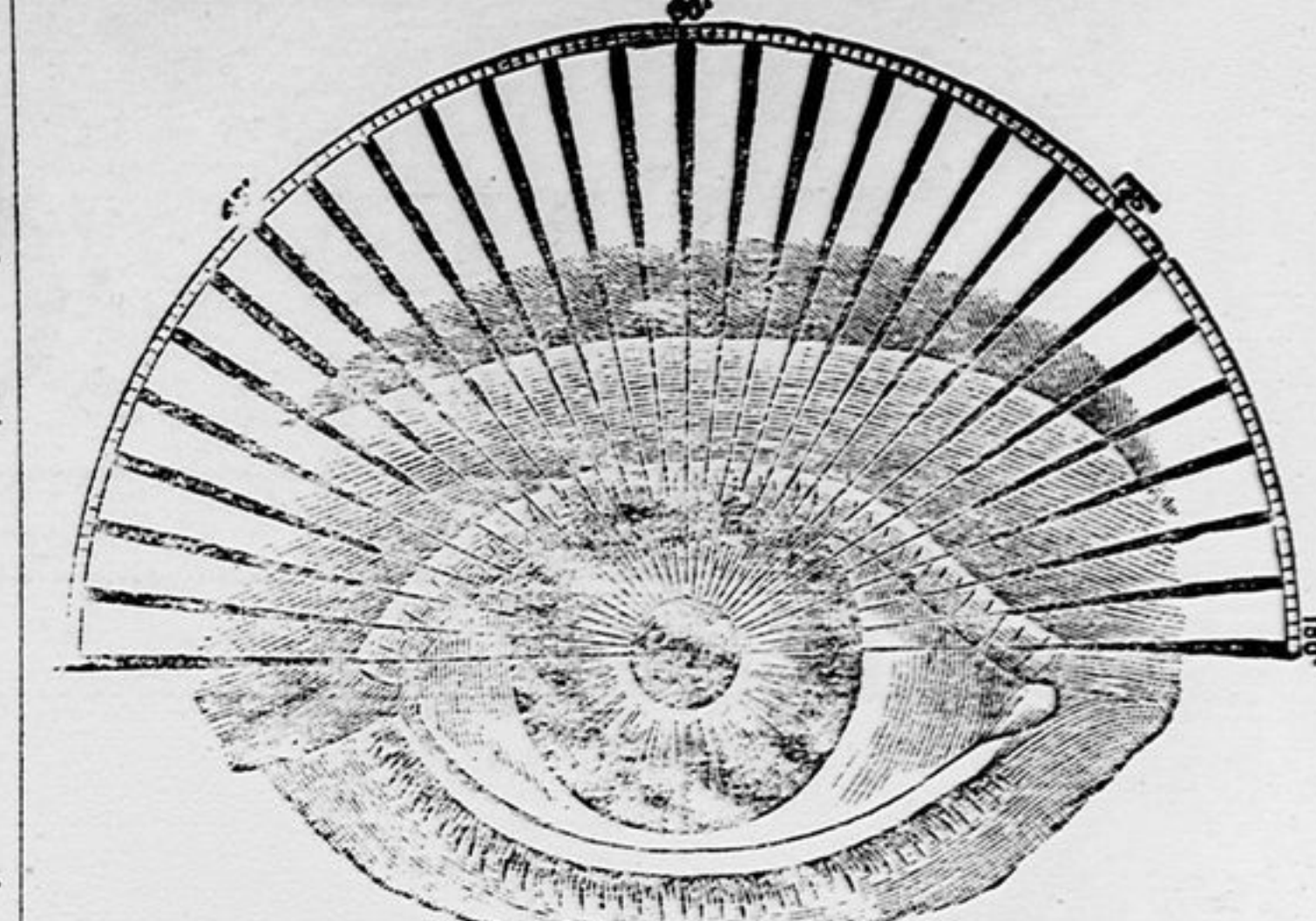
