oning and eloquence. His subject was 'Necessity of Sunday School Work. The parable of the Sower was the basis of his remarks, whatever the parents would sow in the hearts of their children that would they reap. And it was astonishing how careless and entirely indifferent some parents were regarding the spiritual education of their children. He said that of the five Provinces of Canada, Ontario was noted for its disregard of spirit all instructions in the schools. He deplored the petty jealousies of denominationalism which hindered the work in the direction of religious instructions in schools. It would be no difficulty whatever to secure instructions in the Bible In schools if all the Churches would join hands and he hoped that a better un-Jerstanding would soon be reached. Each could be done by the parents, if

they would be more anxious about the souls of their children. Mr. Lloyd pointed out how much superfor the Negro-children of the West Indies were in their knowledge of the Bible to the white children of fair Canada. He urged the parents to give their children some Bible training at home, or at any rate to encourage and help the Sunday School teachers in their unselfish and consecrated work to teach the young the knowledge of Ged's Word and precepts. The address was very instructive and everyone regretted that not

more time could be given to Mr. Lloyd to finish all he had to say. Mr. Yellowlees followed this address and gave some very helpfu! thoughts on Responsibilities. His address was very valuable because of its practicle suggestions taken from the speaker's own experience in his long years of faithful service for the Lord. His words found deep echo in the hearts of all, and touching were the instances which he gave of consecrated lives

which have been the consequences of faithful Sunday School teaching. The next speaker was Rev. E. Roberts. 
