**SIXTH ANNUAL CONVENTION**  
OF THE  
**SUNDAY SCHOOLS**  
OF THE  
Township of Emily,  
HELD IN THE  
**PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, OMEMEE,**  
March 13th, 1901.

Though the Convention, as far  
as numerical attendance is con-  
cerned, did not come up to that  
of last year, owing to the unfavor-  
able weather, the Convention it-  
self was a grand success and did  
not disappoint those whose ex-  
pectations regarding the same  
were the most sanguine.

The Convention opened at 10  
a. m., to proceed with the busi-  
ness matters of the Association.  
Rev. G. Brown conducted the De-  
votional Exercises, which were  
interspersed with the singing of  
hymns.

The nominating Committee  
was appointed as follows: Messrs.  
W. H. Curry, J. N. Thompson M. D.,  
Isaiah Thornton, Moses Ruth,  
W. H. Hooper, and T. Dawson.  
The Treasurer W. H. Curry  
gave the financial report, and Dr.  
Thompson presented a most en-  
couraging report of the various  
Sunday Schools. They all showed  
marked progress and efficiency.  
After the reports were discus-  
sured by the Delegates, the nomi-  
nating Committee withdrew for con-  
sultation, the result of which was  
the nomination of the following  
officers, which were elected unani-  
mously.

President, Rev. G. Brown.  
Vice-Presidents, the resident  
Ministers.  
Treasurer, W. H. Curry.  
Secretary, W. W. Jardine, B. A.  
Executive, Isaiah Thornton, Dr.  
Thompson, Miss Curry, M. Ruth,  
S. Connell, David Rea, S. W. Mit-  
chell, J. R. Boate, W. H. Hooper.  
Mr. Isaiah Thornton moved  
and Mr. Moses Ruth seconded,  
that a vote of thanks be tendered  
to the indefatigable Secretary Dr.  
Thompson, who had resigned his  
office. This motion was carried  
enthusiastically. With the sing-  
ing of a hymn and benediction the  
Morning Session was closed.

**AFTERNOON SESSION.**  
At 2.30 a large audience had  
gathered for the afternoon session.  
Key. E. A. Langfeldt M. A., con-  
ducted the Devotional Exercises.  
Mr. J. A. Jackson deferred his  
address to the Evening Session as  
he was desirous to give as many  
informations regarding the  
Provincial S. S. Association as  
possible; and thus he was en-  
gaged in answering the questions  
asked from the audience.

A paper by Mr. S. Couch on  
"Teacher's Encouragements and  
Discouragements" was the next  
item on the programme.  
It dealt with various facts that  
will spring up in the experiences  
of Teacher's and discourage them.  
The writer advised all teachers to  
be so absorbed with their subject  
as never to have time to look for  
any discouragements.

Miss Curry's paper "Thoughts  
by a S. S. Teacher," was very  
much enjoyed and full of practical  
thoughts and lessons. Its material  
was no doubt gathered from the  
experience of many years devoted  
to Sunday School work. A few  
points were especially very sug-  
gestive and instructive to both  
parents and teachers.  
"The Sunday School is not to  
take the parents place." Many  
parents think their obligation is  
only to send the children to S. S.,  
and then be relieved of all respon-  
sibility. But it is not so; they  
must teach the religion to their  
children.

"Do not be afraid to teach them  
God's Word, they will remember it  
when they have forgotten yours"  
"Do not get discouraged by not  
seeing results; do your work faith-  
fully in teaching; let the Lord re-  
ceive the results. Another point  
was, that the parents should re-  
member the S. S. Teachers of their  
children in prayer, and that the  
teachers ought also to pray for  
their scholars"  
A lively discussion ensued in  
which Rev. E. A. Langfeldt, Mr.  
W. W. Jardine, Rev. G. Brown,  
Dr. Thompson and Mr. John M.  
Crae took part, and excellent  
points were brought out.  
Mr. W. W. Jardine then taught  
the Sunday School lesson from St  
Luke XXIII: 13-26, which was  
very instructive and well prepared.  
The "Round Table Conference"  
was a new departure and was  
much enjoyed.

has the greatest responsibility.  
Many men, being engaged in  
clubs, or society or their daily  
work, leave this teaching to the  
mothers, but if they do it, they do  
so wrongly. The father is the  
head of the family, the policy of  
the household lies upon the father;  
the mother certainly may teach  
the children, but the responsibility  
rests upon the father.

Relationship involves responsi-  
bility; father and mother being  
both related to the children, there-  
fore, they both share in the re-  
sponsibility.

We notice the Children's Aid  
Society looking after waifs; the  
police taking hold of people who  
are making a nuisance of them-  
selves. Why is it? Because, liv-  
ing together in relationship to a  
community involves responsibil-  
ity.

If. The sense of responsibil-  
ity cannot be shifted. While the  
parent sends his children rightly  
to school to be taught by teachers,  
he does not give up his responsi-  
bility as to the supervision of the  
teacher's and his children's work.  
The speaker approves of the re-  
verend reading of the Scriptures in  
Schools without religious instruc-  
tions. Teachers may be Chris-  
tians or Agnostics. Therefore he  
thinks that religious instruction  
should be given by the Church to  
which God had given the care and  
spiritual education of the young.

The Sunday School System  
ought to be graded similar to the  
secular schools. The parents have  
responsibility to the Sunday  
School and its improvement.  
Mr. Hughson lamented that so  
many parents were so negligent  
regarding the home training of  
their children. They forget that  
unconsciously they are training  
them by their acts, by what the  
children see in them. It may also  
be a heritage of a bad hereditary.

The old nature may be coming  
out in the children through the  
parents.  
The Parent's responsibility to  
the Sunday School lies in "over-  
sight." They ought to follow  
their children with prayers, they  
ought never to criticize the Sun-  
day School Teacher before the  
children. Parents generally do  
not recognize their obligations to  
the Sunday School Teacher for  
training their children. If faults  
are found with a teacher let the  
parents take proper steps, but let  
them not gossip about it before  
the public unknown to the teach-  
er.

But the parents have also respon-  
sibility to the children. 1. As to  
conduct. Many parents find fault  
with a S. S. teacher for scolding a  
child because of bad conduct.  
They think it quite just that a  
teacher ought to be satisfied with  
the treatment which a naughty  
boy or girl may choose to give.  
Let the parents become members  
of Sunday School and show the  
child good conduct. 2. As to  
preparation of the lesson. Many  
children seldom read over their  
lesson before going to Sunday  
School. Parents hardly know the  
lesson themselves. Let them  
study the lesson with their child-  
ren and assist them. Some boys  
are ashamed to study the Bible  
because their parents never do it.  
Family worship is practised in  
but very few homes. How dare  
such neglectful parents ever stand  
before God to give account of how  
they have attended to their respon-  
sibility 3. As to Conversion.  
Many parents say they cannot  
talk with their children about  
Jesus. If they only began young,  
sacred things would become more  
familiar. If parents do not teach  
their children, the devil will do it.  
The speaker thought that he  
never found fault with a man who  
would stay home from Church or  
the weekly service occasionally  
that he might teach his children  
the Word of God.

Mr. J. A. Jackson, B. A., Provincial  
Secretary of S. S. Association was the  
next speaker.  
His subject was the history of Sun-  
day Schools, and the Divine Sanction  
of it. It was nothing new when about  
121 years ago Robert Ralston instituted  
Sunday Schools. It did exist before  
the day of Abraham there was al-  
ready a systematic teaching in use.  
Ezra had all the children together in a  
Bill School. In the days of the Lord  
Jesus there was also a system of Bible  
Schools. In the Church of the first  
Century people took care to instruct  
the children in the sacred lessons.  
The Sunday School is of Jewish origin  
and of Christian sanction.

In the 16th Century a Roman Cath-  
olic Cardinal founded Sunday Schools  
in Italy. In the 17th Century the Pur-  
itan clergymen instituted them also.  
But at first the S. S. were not volun-  
tary, teachers were paid, and it is very  
questionable whether religion was  
taught at all. They were more like  
the present day schools. In 1872 the  
International Sunday School System  
was introduced. The people began  
then to realize the importance of the  
Sunday School in the world. The  
School of the future will be what we  
prepare the way for.  
The speaker pointed out some errors  
to be guarded against. 1. It is not a  
nursery of the Church. Older boys and  
girls object being sent to a nursery.  
Have a nursery in connection with the  
Sunday School, by bringing the home  
into the Sunday School.
