House that the determination of the government was, that the investigation should be by a commission of two judges of the Supreme Court and that the terms of the commission would be drawn up by the ministry. Mr. Whitney contended that the ends of justice would be better served by having Mr. Stratton tried by a committee of the House; and the question to be discussed is which of these methods will best secure the object to be attained. If it be borne continually in mind what that object really is, it will be easier to arrive at a just and fair decision. Undoubtedly all fair-minded men will admit that the great end and purpose of the investigation is to ascertain all the facts of the case and lay them before the electors of the province. They are the judges tha must ultimately decide who are the guilty parties and what should be the punish ment awarded them. That punishment must be at least, the expulsion of the dastards from the House and from public life for the rest of their lives. Which shall it be then: by a commission of judges or by a committee of the House? As it is supposed that
