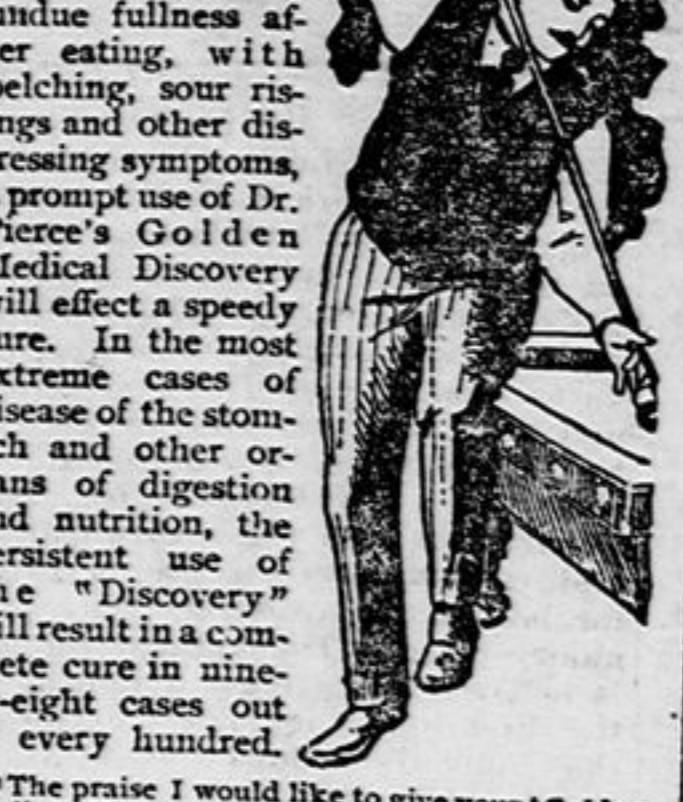

Church Notes, Omeme.

CHRIST CHURCH.

LENTEN SERVICES.

The Lenten Services, held in Christ Church this year, are better attended than ever before. On Wednesday evening a shortened form of Evening Prayer is used, after which the address is delivered. The Rector's assistant, Mr. Herbert G. Forster, gives the Wednesday evening address, and has taken "Faith" and its various expressions, as his subject, all through. These addresses have been most interesting and instructive, and those who attend have been much pleased and edified. The Rector feels grateful for so able an assistant, and predicts a bright future for Mr. Forster's ministry.

The Friday evening services consist of the Litany, and an address by the Rector. The various petitions of the Lord's Prayer, their spiritual application and interpretation, have been the themes at this evening service. Offer-tories are taken up at each weeknight service during Lent, the sum total to be devoted to the cause of missions.

Choir practice follows each week-night service. The choir, under the able leadership of Mr. Wm. G. Stephenson, is making every effort to prepare the beautiful Choral Service of the Church for Easter Sunday evening, when the members appear for the first time, in their vestments, with processional and recessional hymns.

SUNDAY SERVICES, MARCH 6.

Two services, morning and evening, were held in Christ Church on Sunday last, the Rector's assistant taking the services in St. James' and St. John's, Emily. Holy Communion was celebrated at the morning service, many partaking of the pledges of Eternal Life.

The morning sermon was based upon the first successful temptation of Samson, the text being taken from the Book of Judges XIV: 3. "Is there never a woman among the daughters of thy brethren, or among all thy people that thou goest to take a wife of the uncircumcised Philistines." After drawing various lessons from this particular part of Samson's history, the Rector said in conclusion:—

"The ready excuses that many make for themselves, when they yield to temptation, are signs of a feebleness of will, when vigorous honor and chastity should assert themselves. How often, alas, is moral weakness and unfaithfulness to duty, encouraged by exaggerating the force of evil influence. Many a drunkard is made by prating about heredity, and the giant grasp of demon drink. Why should it be considered a feat to live "soberly, righteously and godly in this present world." Tenderness to the weak is certainly a christian duty, but is there no danger that young and old alike, bearing much of the seductions of sin, and little of the ready help of the Almighty, submit easily when they ought to fight, yes, and conquer too, and reckon Divine forbearance, when they ought to expect only contempt and reproach? Our age and generation need to hear again the words of St. Paul, "There hath no temptation taken you, but such as man can bear, but God is faithful, Who will not suffer you to be tempted above what ye are able."

Is there a tremendous pressure constantly urging us to evil? In our large cities especially is the power of iniquity almost despotic? True enough, but surely men are not intended to be effeminate weaklings. For every enticement to evil there is a stronger allure-ment to good, for one argument in favor of immorality, ten may be advanced on behalf of virtue, and where sin abounds, grace doth much more abound. People are indeed tempted, and we, who aspire after a far higher ideal than that of interested innocence, believe, that nothing is gained by speaking of them as if they were children incapable of decision, of whom it can only be expected that they will fail. By the Spirit of God all moral victories are gained, and because men do not breathe deeply of that Spirit, they complain that their hearts do not beat with the strength of holy courage, and with the thrill of high resolve."
