MR. J. H. CARNEGIE, M. P. P., BANQUETTED.

A Very Happy Complimentary Event Took Place in Kinnmount on Friday Night.

The splendid victory of the popular member for East Victoria, so roused the admiration of his admirers at Kinnmount that they could not forbear to express it in that very pleasant and expressive way—a banquet.

This function took place at Scott's Hotel, Kinnmount, on Friday night, when about 50 of the leading Conservatives of the village and vicinity, and several Liberals who share his following, good-will toward Mr. Carnegie, sat around the festive board.

Mr. James Wilson, Reeve of Somerville, presided, and Dr. White, of Kinnmount, was in the Vice Chair. On Reeve Wilson's right sat the guest of the evening and on his left Mr. F. H. Dobbin, managing editor of the Peterboro Review, who, in the unavoidable absence of Mr. T. E. Bradburn, the member-elect for West Peterboro, was the representative of that gentleman.

Among others from outside were: Messrs. J. H. Delamere, editor of the Minden Echo, Jas. Thompson, John Cowan, Minden, D. Kilpatrick, Lindsay, Geo. Lytle and A. W. Mallett of the Watchman Warder.

Letters of regret were read from Dr. Mason, Fenelon Falls, T. E. Bradburn, M. P. P. for West Peterboro, Sam Fox, M. P. P. for West Victoria and Col. Sam Hughes, M. P. P. for Victoria and Hamilton.

Miss Host Scott put up a bill of fare of city dimensions and quality, and the excellent equipment and service provided were the subject of approving comment. When the epistemic demands had been met, Chairman Wilson proposed the toast of "The King," which was the signal for a hearty rendering of the National Anthem.

Then came "Canada" which brought Mr. F. H. Dobbin, of the Peterboro Review, to his feet with a clever eulogy for the land of the maple. So large did this splendid country now loom in the eyes of our American cousins, that when at the St. Louis fair last fall, Mr. Dobbin was frequently asked why Canadians did not consider some plan of annexation. The Americans were dependent on Canadian wheat for making first class flour. We should put an export duty on our wheat, protecting ourselves was the only way to become a nation. The fact that Canada's friendly trade overtures made to the Americans years ago, had been rejected, had resulted in a spirit of independence that was a capital thing for Canada to-day.

Canada's possibilities were vast. As yet our great lakes had only a beginning of the great steamship fleets that yet should sail them; most of our great wheatland acreage was yet untouched by the plow; deep below the surface lay our vast mineral resources. To develop all these was the clear duty of any government, and failure to develop them would bring upon any government the displeasure of the people.

The next toast was that of "The Press," and it was responded to by Messrs. J. H. Delamere, of the Minden Echo, and Geo. Lytle and A. W. Mallett, of the Watchman Warder, all giving spirited addresses, and spoke in congratulatory terms of the member-elect for East Victoria and the work of the people who had placed him in that position.

OUR GUEST. "Our Guest" was the next toast proposed, and Mr. Carnegie was received with hearty applause and a lusty rendering of "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." Mr. Carnegie said that he had clear recollection of the chief incident of four campaigns, but he had never before received so hearty support or so much personal loyalty as in the last one, nor been accorded such a hearty welcome as on the present occasion. He well knew the obligation under which his friends had placed him. "I carried the banner," said Mr. Carnegie, "but you, gentlemen, won the fight, and I thank you. (Applause). "I am prepared to say, for I realize it, I hope to the full that the support I received was far from a purely party support. I know that I am indebted for support to the independent Liberals.
