Progress of the War.

Russia's immediate answer to the disaster at Mukden is an order for the sending of two more army corps to Manchuria, and the mobilization of the Grenadier Guards, one of the crack corps of St. Petersburg. General Gripenberg is spoken of as the probable commander of this new army, which is evidence that in the dispute between himself and General Kuropatkin as to the responsibility for the previous defeat at Sandepas the latter has been worsted.

It will no doubt take some months for these reinforcements to reach the Far East, and a question is, when they arrive there will they find any of Kuropatkin's army left to relieve? The remnants of the latter's shattered forces have been slowly dragging into Tie Pass, and the apparent intention is to make a stand there against the victorious and advancing Japanese. Their immediate hope is in the exhaustion of Marshal Oyama's pursuing troops, which would give General Kuropatkin a little time to get his men once more into shape and strengthen the defences of Tie Pass.

The probabilities do not seem to favor the Russians being able to make a stand at Tie Pass. Whatever the number of General Kuropatkin's army originally, with total losses of over two hundred thousand men it is now greatly outnumbered by the forces at Marshal Oyama's command. The former's men are demoralized by repeated defeat, the latter's are flushed with victory, in perfect fighting trim, and have abundance of supplies. It is not at all sure that the Russians have sufficient, as they have had to abandon immense stores.

There is a report, which is not confirmed, that Marshal Oyama's flanking armies are already in touch behind Tie Pass. Should this turn out to be correct General Kuropatkin is entirely surrounded and there would be nothing left for him but surrender. It is significant that nothing has been heard for several days from General Kamamura's forces, which were supposed to be operating in the northward, and they may be yet reported north of Tie Pass cutting off the further retreat of the Russians.

Marshal Oyama will, no doubt, push right on to Harbin, which is practically the geographical centre of Manchuria. It is located on the Sungari River, at the point where the Trans-Siberian R. ilway deflects southward to Mukden and Port Arthur, and has a population of about 65,000.—Globe of Tuesday.

Emily Council Proceedings.

Omeme, Emily, March 7th, 1905. Council met at ten o'clock, a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Present all the members, the Reeve in the chair.

The minutes of the last session were read, approved and on motion confirmed.

The following communications were received, perused and filed, that is to say:

From J. R. McNeillie, County Clerk, advising that the petition in re change of period for taking assessment was duly received, and although the time for presenting had passed the rule was in this case suspended and the petition presented.

From A. W. Campbell, Commissioner of Highways in re good roads movement and issue of annual report by the Dept. of Public Works. From R. Bannan, requesting that he be not re-appointed Pathmaster and Fence-viewer for the coming year. From J. R. McNeillie, County Clerk, advising re change of period for taking assessment had not been granted, as the County Council did not think it advisable to grant same and giving reasons therefor. From Climax Road Machine Company re road machinery. From J. H. Knight, Public School Inspector, advising that as no ratepayers in the Township of Emily had given notice to the Clerk on or previous to the 1st day of March that they were Separate School supporters in compliance with Sec. 42 of the Separate Schools Act, it would therefore be the duty of the Council to collect the taxes under sec. 70 of the Public Schools Act, from every ratepayer in the Township and that the Council had no authority to collect or assist in collecting any tax for a separate school. From Patrick A. Devine protesting against payment of the fenceviewers fees under the Perdue Devine line fence award. From J. R. McNeillie, County Clerk, enclosing certified copy of the By-Law passed by the County Council for the purpose of designating the roads to form a County Roads System.

Councillor Courtney presented a communication from Mr. James F. Kenney, requesting the passing of a resolution petitioning the Legislative Assembly for a grant towards the opening up and improvement of the portion of the Western Boundary opposite Lot 1 con. 14, in the Township of Emily.

Messrs. George R. Carey, John Carey and Robert H. Casey, petitioned for the closing of the old road or loop line across or through lots No. 17 and 18 in the fourth concession.

After discussion in the matter of the payment of the fenceviewers fees in connection with the Perdue Devine line fence award it was decided to leave same in the hands of Councillor Herlihy with a view to his effecting an amicable settlement thereof.

Moved by Councillor H. Fee, sec. by Councillor William Cottingham, that the several persons hereinafter named be appointed the pathmasters and fenceviewers in this Municipality for the current year for the several road divisions as set forth in By-Law No. 260, which is set opposite his name and that each of the said named pathmasters be also a fenceviewer, that is to say:—
