**SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.**  
Address, "Art of Illustration," Delivered by Rev. Mr. Craig.

Illustration is the use of some familiar figure or symbol to set forth a truth we have in mind. Something we use to put it in a visible or parallel form. The mind seems to crave illustration and thought has taken this form for communication in all ages. It is the most natural means of communication, and the illustration in its various forms, and arrangements of things, and all nature around us may be made to speak to us of all three.  
There are three forms of illustration. The first is the parable, the picture and the tableau, each with regard to some particular side of the mental powers, and we employ them with judgment accordingly. The parable is a story or a familiar figure which is employed to set forth some truth which is in the mind.  
It is a two fold in form. There is one which is a similitude, and the one which is a story. A similitude is something which is employed to set forth something which is in the mind. A story is used to set forth some quality which is in the inner heart, and the characters are made to illustrate the qualities which are to be set forth. Take for example the case of "the good Samaritan."  
This is the most natural way in which to bring before the mind of people any quality which is in the mind. Pictures are because it is allowing us to look at these qualities in the only way in which it is ever rendered visible. For some reason a story lingers longer in the mind than anything else. Like other things, a picture in using a story, that it fixes a truth more firmly in the mind. We find that the greatest Teacher of all used this method of imparting truth.

The next form of illustration is the picture. That is a very good form because it deals with the eye-sight. Sight is the quickest and the clearest of the senses. We can take in more with the eye than any other way. When we can employ a picture, it is of value to us. All feel that if we can have a picture to set forth some particular scene or incident in the lesson, it will fasten that truth more firmly in the mind. Pictures make a clean and lasting impression.  
The same is true of the tableau. I hope we all believe in the value of illustration and are anxious to be proficient in the art.
