**A HERO OF THE CRIMEA**  
Visits the City to Be Present at the Funeral of a Daughter.

He Tells the Story of the Immortal Six Hundred at Balaklava.

There has been in the city for the past few days one of the heroes of the Crimean War, in the person of John Martin of Lindsay, Ontario, and he is one of the five living survivors of that heroic exploit, which will go down in history for all time as one of the most daring and heroic actions of the world. Mr. Martin has been in the city with his estimable wife on a sad mission, that of attending the funeral of one of his daughters, who was the estimable wife of Mr. Edward Minor, ex-telephone operator at police headquarters. Mrs. Minor was married to her husband about 1840 and a half ago and was buried Wednesday afternoon from the family home, 524 Franklin avenue, in a quiet way with all the respect that could be shown by a grief-stricken husband and a father and mother who dearly loved her.

Mr. Martin is a typical Irish grenadier, is one of the most patriotic of the subjects of Queen Victoria. He has no use for anything under the sun that is not set to the tune of "God Save the Queen." He is a fine specimen of manhood, has a true Irish heart in his bosom, and is vested with the warm and generous feelings of the British soldier. He has served his country with a fund of humor that has proved him in all the calamities of his life and that has contrived more to his hale and hearty old age than anything else. He has not much use for the "Bismarck" blokes who would set America against his country and he is not an admirer of President Cleveland or Secretary Olney.

Mr. Martin was born in County Down, Ireland, Aug. 29, 1837, in the same year that Queen Victoria ascended the British throne. He entered the service of the queen at Dublin, April 20, 1854, joining the Scottish Fusiliers. He went to the Crimea with the 9th Regiment, which was eventually to demonstrate that "Paths of glory lead but to the grave," on July 31, embarking from Dublin for Cork and after contending to the Crimea, stopping on the way at Gibraltar and Malta.

He first set foot in the Crimea at Varna on the Black sea a few days after he was 17, the youngest soldier of the line in the Fusiliers. The regiment that had brought the regiment to the scene of the war was joined by the regiments of French, English and Turkish in the Crimea, when lying there until the mobilization of the allied troops had been accomplished, and when joined by them, all proceeded up the sea to the Crimea, starting in time to arrive at the city of Sebastopol, Sept. 14, 1854.

The allied armies left this point on the morning of the 19th at 3 o'clock in the morning for the dreary march through a hostile country that was to end in Inkerman, through the bloody Selds of Alma, through the siege of Balaklava, down into the glorious, immortal plains of Balaklava, and through the great battlefields in front of Inkerman. The terrific bombardment of the city of Sebastopol until that time the most terrific cannonading that had ever reverberated in the mountains or over the vales of any part of the world, was witnessed by this 17-year-old soldier with the delight that ever attaches to the battlefield by the fiery, undaunted temper of youth. When the 150 huge cannons of the allied armies belched forth their death-dealing fire, the devoted city on that calm and beautiful October morning at the signal of the simultaneous raising of the British ensign and the tri-color of France, the youthful soldier threw up his shako with the rest of the English grenadiers and shouted with the loudest. When, after a siege that resulted in the overthrow of a city and disheartened the foe to the extent that all the other battalions of the allied forces were victorious and changed the history of the world, the young Irishman was at the front taking his turn at duty in the trenches with the veterans of many wars. When the battle of Inkerman was fought in the early days of the next year Mr. Martin was temporarily disabled by a

bullet of a bayonet in the right cheek and a minute ball in the right leg, but he did not give in until the battle was over and the Russians driven from the field. He remained in the field hospital until able for duty and did not leave the Crimea until in 1856 the regiment, the Scottish Fusiliers was ordered home on a furlough.

To hear the old hero and veteran of 39 years' service in the armies of her majesty, one is transported into the Crimea, one can hear the shouts of the brave men who rode "into the jaws of death, into the mouth of hell"; one can hear the reverberations of the cannon before the devoted city of Sebastopol and one can look prospectively into the years that followed and estimate something of the change that the heroic conduct of the soldiers of the English army in that terrible campaign made in the subsequent events of the world's history.

While hearing the old veteran describe the hardships of that campaign, one catches the martial spirit of the nations that spurred up the war-like heroes of those years of the middle of the nineteenth century, even daily eliminating in the great civil war of the American republic, and later found an echo in the great Franco-Prussian war, et cetera, et cetera.

Mr. Martin wears with becoming pride two handsome medals, one presented by Queen Victoria and the other given by the Sultan of Turkey. The latter is an appreciation of the heroic valor that took the 600 into the fight on the plains of Balaklava. Both are of solid silver and are very valuable for the inscriptions. The Victorian medal has a wreath of laurel in silver on the ribbon suspending the medal proper, on which are inscribed the words that have a volume of meaning to the student of history, and has a wealth of affectionate and glorious memories to the survivors of the Crimean war. The words are: "Alma, Sebastopol, Balaklava, Inkerman." The medal proper of both the gifts are appropriately inscribed.

Mr. Martin now lives in peace and contentment in his home in Lindsay, but it is highly probable that it there should be a scrimmage he thinks it could be but a scrimmage in which the troops of his majesty would win the American as off the face of the earth, the old veteran would harness up and go into the thick of the fight with the enthusiasm of the young of 17.

The old soldier leaves to-day for his Canadian home, convinced that America is a good country to read about, but not a good country for a loyal subject of her majesty to carry in.—Ohio State Journal of March.
