

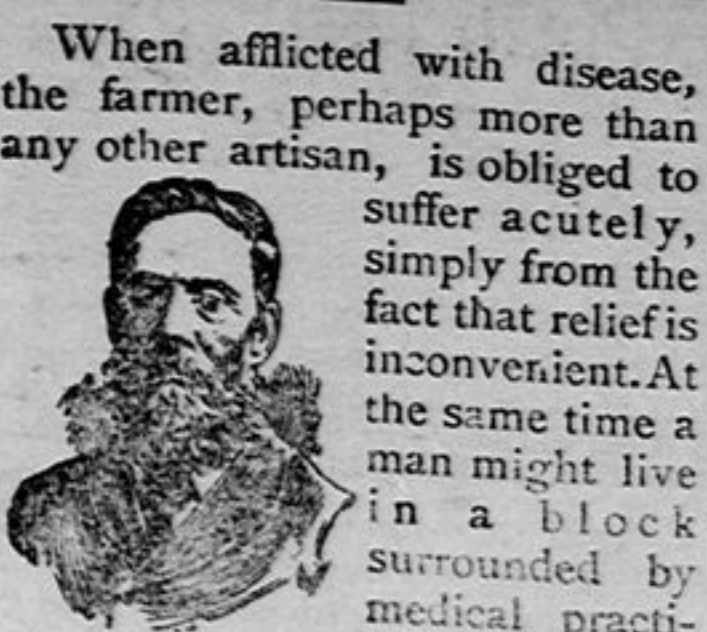

Seven years ago the Presbyterian Review, which was then in its ninth year of publication, was bought by the Messrs. T. R. and J. P. Clougher. Since that time the Review has steadily improved, both in literary excellence and commercially.

The Cloughers were the first to introduce into Canada the now popular small page style, high quality paper, frequent illustrations, and the many features which made the modern Church paper so attractive, including the pleasing variety of a large staff of editorial writers, most of whom were specialists in their department.

Three years ago the Messrs. Clougher formed the Presbyterian Review Company, Limited, with Mr. T. R. as business manager and Mr. J. P. as Secretary and Treasurer, and engaged in other branches of publishing, which have more and more occupied their time and attention.

Early this year, Mr. T. R. Clougher retired from the management in order to take the Managing Directorship of the newly incorporated Canadian Camera and Optical Company, Limited so that the Review Company had to consider as to his successor.

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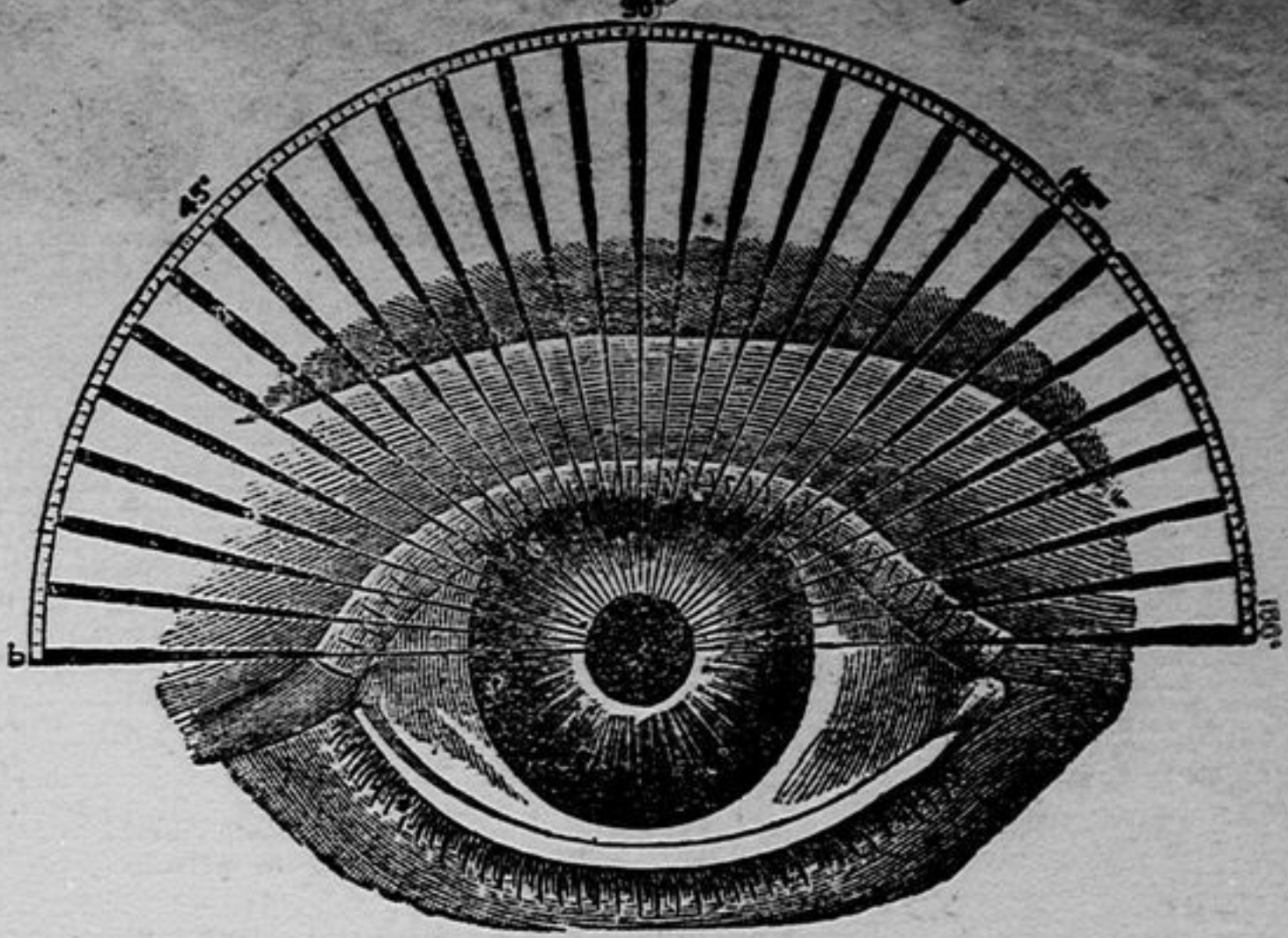
