

The Census Taking. the following provisions of the law governing their work should be made known.

Here are the sections :-Every person who wilfully, or without lawful excuse, refuses or neglects to fill up, to the best of his knowledge and belief, any schedule which he has been required to fill up by any enumerator or other persons emuses or neglects to sign and deliver up er otherwise return the same when and as required, or causes to be made, signed, dellyered or returned, any wilfully false answer or statement as to any matter specified in such schedule, shall freur a penalty not exceeding forty dollars and not less than one

dollar, 42 V., c. 21, s. 15 Every person who without lawful excuse. efuses or neglects to answer, or who wilfully answers falsely any question requisite for obtaining any information sought in respect of the census or pertinent thereto, which has been asked of him by any enumerator or other person employed in the ex-Ontario, ecution of this Act, shall for every such refusal, neglect or wilful false answer, incur Sheeting.
