Omemeo-Emily, April 1, 1901

Fifty-second year, fourth session. Council met at ten o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment. Present, all the members, the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of last session were read, approved, and on motion confirmed. The following communications were received, perused and filed, viz: From Senator McHugh, acknowledging the receipt of copy of motion asking his assistance in obtaining a revote of the lapsed Cowan's Bridge Dominion grant, and intimating that in view of certain statements made by the present Member for this riding, concerning the expenditure of public moneys on this bridge, when canvassed previous to last election, that he could not assist said Member or work in conjunction with him in endeavoring to obtain a revote of said grant, but that his own personal services were still at the disposal of the Council.

From A. E. Vrooman, Esq., M. P. enclosing report of questions asked by him in re. "Cowan's Bridge Grant," and answers thereto as made by the Hon. Minister of Public Works, in the House of Commons, Ottawa, and advising the procuring and ordering immediately of a proper official report of the construction of the bridge and further intimating that some person or persons were making certain reports in the matter which reports were having an adverse effect in the revoting of said grant.

From R. B. Rogers, Esq., Engineer, advising his intention of reporting officially in the matter of "Cowan's Bridge," immediately, and intimating that the usual manner of procedure in such cases was for the municipality to apply for the grant and this application was sent on to him to report on, in this case he understood the application was made by Mr. McHugh, but it was never sent to him for report. That he had reported verbally that the bridge was completed, although he never was formally asked to do so. That the bridge was not completed at the time the grant lapsed, but that he understood from Mr. McHugh, whom he met on his way to Ottawa during this last summer, that he (Mr. McHugh) was going to have the time extended, which it appears was not done.

From H. Matthews enclosing a petition signed by himself and eighteen others, requesting the passing of a by-law regulating the conduct, etc., of horse stands within the limits of this municipality.

George McHugh, Senator, Ottawa, acknowledging the receipt of his communication in the matter of a revote of the Dominion Government Grant towards the construction of "Cowan's Bridge," and requesting him to take such steps as he thought most advisable towards obtaining a revote of said grant, or a possible increase thereof, intimating at same time that in view of his former interest therein, together with his statements publicly and otherwise made, the Council expect him to carry this matter through successfully.—Carried.
