

**KILLIN-KEOUGH  
CONCERT COMPANY**

The Killin-Keough Concert Company, of New York City, last night gave an entertainment of more than usual interest to lovers of classical music, and although the weather was most unpropitious, a large audience turned out to greet the performers, in the Y. M. C. A. Hall.

The Company consists of Mrs. Alice Killin-Keough, prima donna soloist; Mr. James Potter Keough, basso, and Miss Maude Brown, pianiste, and were assisted by Miss Agnes Paterson. Miss Maude Brown, in her capacity of accompaniste, should be especially mentioned. All of those who took part showed the result of excellent training, and, in spite of the somewhat unsuitable auditorium, the various items on the programme left but little to be desired.

The programme opened with a duet by Mr. and Mrs. Keough, which was succeeded by a solo from Mr. Keough, entitled "A Dream." In this the singer received the merited encore of the audience.

Mrs. Killin-Keough then sang from Verdi's popular opera, "La Traviata," which was enthusiastically encored.

Miss Brown most successfully played a waltz (chromatique 5th) which in itself was a proof of her skill as a pianiste.

One might mention as a specimen of sweet and nicely shaded singing "The Old Canoe," a duet, which was itself followed by another entitled "Estudiana." The next two songs, "Four-Leaf Clover" and "An Open Secret," were sung by Mrs. Killin-Keough, with remarkable pathos and consequent success.

Miss Agnes Paterson gave an inimitable recitation entitled "How the Frenchman treated John Bull," and as an amateur, her work bids fair to establish for herself a reputation, enviable by that class of local performers.

What was perhaps one of the best songs of the evening was sung by Mr. Keough, entitled "What the Chimney Sang," the words of which were written by Bret Harte. The success of this song was followed up by another, that of the song entitled "Big Ben," a song of the great bell in the House of Commons, London, England.

The next item was a scene from "Faust," which was given in costume by Mrs. Killin-Keough. The small stage was a novel place for a scene from such a world famed opera, but the audience was most demonstrative in its approval. The scene given was the one in which Marguerite, returning from church, goes to the bower and spins, singing an old song, which is interrupted with thoughts of Faust, whom she

met by the way. She then discovers the bouquet left by Siebel and the basket of jewels left by Mephistopheles on behalf of Faust. She adorns herself with the jewels while singing the aria. This was followed by a duet from "Don Munio." This work is based upon a legend of the Spanish and Moorish Wars, told by Washington Irving. The scene of the duet was in the castle of Don Munio. He received an order from the sovereign to proceed to battle, and took leave of Donna Maria.

More than passing mention should be given to the work of Mrs. Killin-Keough. To an attractive platform presence she adds the artistic use of a soprano voice of great sweetness and large range; even in the highest register it shows no sign or weakened calibre. She made an especial success of the jewel song from Faust, and her rendering of the Traviata selection was very brilliant, vivid vocal colour being given to the florid passages which mark the Italian school of opera. Her fine voice has evidently been carefully trained and she knows how to use it, and any learning singer would be fortunate in acquiring the secret of her effective method.

The concert, which, as can be easily imagined, was a most classical one, was suitably brought to a close by the singing of "God Save the King."—*Examiner.*

**The Great Conspiracy Trial.**

The commission appointed to investigate into the truth of the charges made by Mr. Gamey against Mr. Stratton and other ministers of conspiring to buy his vote, was formally opened on Friday afternoon. The Judges appointed to try the case are Chancellor Sir John Boyd and Chief Justice Falconbridge. A great many distinguished lawyers have been retained by both sides, and Mr. S. C. Blake, K. C., will be Chief Counsel for Mr. Gamey, while Mr. E. B. Johnson, K. C., will perform like duty for the accused ministers. After the Court had been formally opened, Mr. Blake, on behalf of Mr. Gamey, asked for an adjournment for 10 days on the grounds that it was utterly impossible to get Mr. Gamey's witnesses from Manitoulin in any less time. The Court accordingly postponed the hearing of evidence till April 13th.

In some respects this postponement is to be regretted, as an anxious public will have to wait that much longer for the facts of the case, but it is clear that the delay was unavoidable.

The delay will, however, have one great advantage. The house will have resumed its session, before the investigation can be concluded, and thus will be able to watch closely the methods by which the investigation is being conducted. If the government and its lawyers attempt to use, again, such methods of preventing the whole facts from being known as were employed in the case of the commissions appointed to enquire into the rascalities of the West Bruce, Brockville and East Elgin elections, then the House can interfere and put a stop to the costly farce. It is just as well, too, for the judges to know that the country is in no humour now to endure any miscarriage of justice. Its experience of trial of government officials by commission has been such as to cause a suspicion that these commissions are appointed, not to discover wrong doings, but to hide them; and if this commission acts along the same lines as the others have done, it is going to hear some pretty plain talk. This method of investigation has been condemned again and again by the great leaders of the liberal party and the grit members in the House have stultified themselves by voting for it. Besides, this case has been denounced by the entire independent press, not only of Ontario alone, but also of all Canada. It is a great pity that this method of investigation was ever adopted; but now since it has been adopted, the people must see to it that the judges discharge their duties so unfairly imposed upon them, in a thoroughly impartial and upright manner. What the electors of the province require at the hands of these judges, is that they shall ascertain all the facts of the case and lay them before the people without comment. The electors are the true jurors, who having had all the facts laid before them, are to decide whether the accused are guilty or not; and it is certain that they will keep a sharp eye upon the commissioners as to the manner in which they discharge their part of the investigation.

Mr. GAMEY'S LAST RESOLUTION.  
During the closing hours of the session, Mr. Gamey made another appeal to the liberal members of the House to have an open and full investigation, and to that end, moved the following resolution:

"That in proceedings before the said commission the charges to be investigated shall not be restricted to the terms set out in the said commission, but as made and set out by the said Robert Roswell Gamey in this House on Wednesday, March 11, 1903, and formulated by the said Robert Roswell Gamey in his statement as a member of this House on March 27, 1903."

The balance of the amendment consisted of the statement read by Mr. Gamey on Friday last.

But this appeal, like all others of the kind, was utterly useless; the same brute majority that had, so persistently and shamelessly, supported Ross in his determination that no charge of conspiracy should be investigated, voted down this one also.

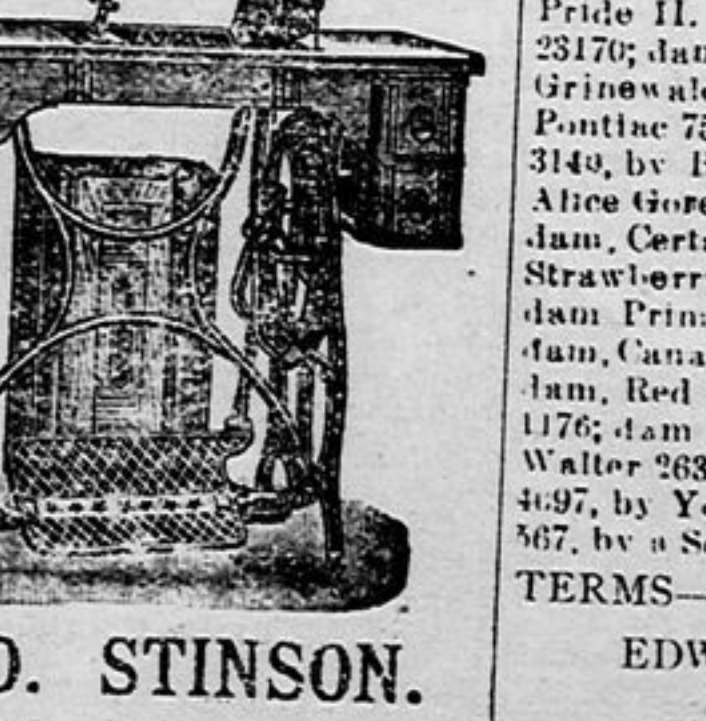
