The Public Library Concert.

The managers of the Omeme Public Library are to be heartily congratulated upon the success which attended their last annual concert. That renowned individual, "the oldest inhabitant" whose word is never doubted, declares that he cannot recall any entertainment, ever given in the village, that gave more pure enjoyment, or that in any way could be regarded as more successful than this one. The Opera House, was packed from end to end, and it is safe to say that there was not one in the immense audience who was dissatisfied with the pleasure and amusement afforded him. The only adverse criticism heard was to the effect that there was too much of these good things.

The chief item in the programme, at least that which took most time, was "The Spinners' Convention." The giving of this occupied about an hour and a half, which was, to the audience, an hour and a half of unrestrained and uninterrupted laughter, varying in degree from the gentle titillation to the loud outburst. It would not have been believed, beforehand, that the young ladies of Omeme possess such marked dramatic talent as was shown by them in their rendition of this difficult burlesque. Had the ladies performing this piece been a job lot from Lindsay or even from Peterboro, one would not have been surprised at them giving this play to life, it would have been quite natural and easy for them to do so; but that the young ladies of this village who, as everyone knows, are famous far and near for their vivacity, youth and beauty, could transform themselves into typical spinners, is a thing hard to realize; but when it is remembered that they kept this up for an hour and a half and did it with such spirit and naturalness that it was hard to believe that they were not what they seemed to be, the thing becomes wonderful. And the question naturally arises where did they get their models? Not in Omeme surely, perhaps they have travelled east and west.

But perhaps the most elevating and refining items on the programme were the two choruses from Gounod's Faust. The Mirror has heard these given many a time by trained professionals, but, and it is only simple justice to say so, never did it hear them better rendered than on this occasion. That there should be found in this village 25 voices that could be trained to sing as those sang took part in these choruses, speaks volumes for the musical talent of Omeme and for the ability and knowledge of their conductor. With such talent as this at its service, Omeme need never go outside of its own boundaries for a first-class musical entertainment.

Besides the Convention and the choruses, songs were sung by Miss Clancy of Omeme and Miss Graham of Peterboro, and by Messrs. R. J. Mulligan and W. G. Stephenson; piano solos by Miss Gumprecht, of Peterboro, and Miss McPherson, Omeme, and a recitation by Miss Kathleen Graham, all given with great taste and skill.

The accompanists were Mrs. R. J. Mulligan and Mr. G. Norris, and it is needless to say that their work was well done.

The proceeds were nearly \$90, which will be of great use to the Library Board.

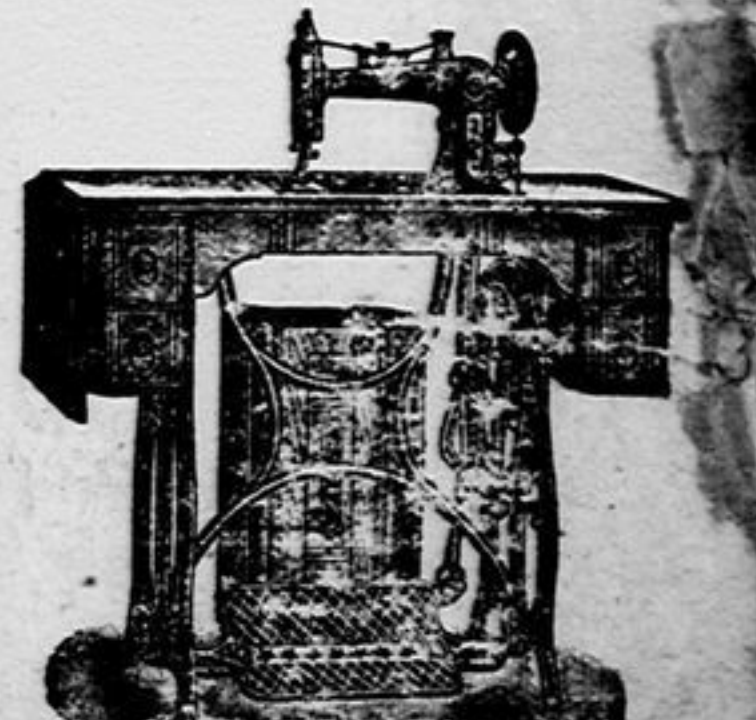
