CAVAN COUNCIL.

Council Chamber, Cavan, April 11th, 1904.

The Council met at 11 o'clock a.m. this day pursuant to adjournment. Members all present, except Coun. Shaw. The Reeve in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read, approved and signed.

The following communications were read, viz:

From Good Roads Machinery Co. From Nicholls' Hospital, Peterboro, respecting Thomas Williamson, who had been there.

From the National Sanitarium Association Hospital, acknowledging receipt of a grant of \$5.00.

From James Franey, applying for office of Collector.

From Township of Cramahe, unanimous resolution for change of members of County Council from the present to former system of representation.

From John S. Fielding, Toronto, respecting designs for bridges.

From Hamilton Bridge Works Co. respecting material for bridges.

All of which were left on table, except the one from Nicholls' Hospital, Peterboro, to which the Clerk was instructed to reply, informing them that Council neither vouched for nor sent Thomas Williamson to the Hospital, and consequently they have no right to assume the account rendered of \$11.20.

The Reeve reported that he had a communication from the Toronto Bank informing the Council there was \$142 to their credit there, and also reported that he, Coun. Staples and Shield waited upon Peterboro Council respecting a grant to Long Swamp road which is proposed to be built on 14th Con. East of Middle road and they were graciously received and have a good prospect of receiving a grant.

Coun. Kelly reported that he inspected a fence of Nath. Belch, and concluded that he get the usual bonus; rate fixed by motion later on in the meeting, and he also inspected cedar purchased from Wm. Wilkinson and Williamson Bros. and found it satisfactory.

On motion accounts of R. Hutchinson for gravel were passed.

On motion Richard Howden and Charles Lough were heard respecting wire fences.

Moved by Coun. Staples, seconded by Coun. Shields, that Couns. Shield and Staples be a Committee to deal with parties on 12th Con. respecting wire fences. Carried.

Coun. Staples introduced by-law No. 461 to appoint overseers of the highway for the current year, subject to Commissioners as prescribed in by-law No. 445, which passed through its several stages, and was signed and sealed, and the names of the Overseers and the No. of their divisions are given hereinafter.

Moved by Coun. Kelly, seconded by Coun. Staples, that the Treasurer receive \$85 for salary and \$5 for postage for 1903.—Carried.

Moved by Coun. Kelly, second by Coun. Staples, that the minimum price be 25 cents per rod and the highest price 35 cents per rod of granite given towards building wire fences.—Carried.

MOTHER OF FOUR CHILDREN.

The trustees, secretary and other officers of the Free Hospital for Consumptives at Muskoka are daily in receipt of many piteous letters.

A few days since Mr. W. J. Gago, of Toronto, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the National Sanitarium Association, received a letter from a resident of Quebec, pleading for the admission of a victim of the dread white plague, living about a hundred miles south-east of Montreal, and asking if it were not possible to admit her into the Free Hospital. The writer says: "The applicant is Mrs. Wm. Patterson, the mother of four children and the wife of a farmer in a place called Goshen, in the township of Windsor. The doctor says that her left lung only is troubled. She is able to go about, but her appetite is very bad. I believe if she could be admitted into the Free Hospital for Consumptives she might be cured. She could not pay much, if anything. Kindly let me know if you could receive her."

We are told by Mr. Gago that applications for admission to the Free Hospital reach the secretary from all points in the Dominion, and patients have been received from Prince Edward Island on the east to Alberta on the west. Two hundred and twenty-five patients have been admitted in eighteen months, and not a single patient has been refused because of his or her poverty.

We can hardly think of any charity that appeals more pathetically for the support of the Canadian people.

A SAD CASE.

The following letter, addressed to the Secretary of the National Sanitarium Association, Toronto, from the Rectory, Norwood, Ont., and signed by Rev. J. McKee McLennan, a well-known Anglican minister of the province, needs no comment of ours. It reads: "I desire to secure the admission into the Free Hospital for Consumptives at Gravenhurst of a young woman, a member of my parish. The case is a very sad one, and if help can be given, a promising life can be saved. Three years ago the mother died of consumption. Since that time it has been my painful duty to bury two of the sons with the same disease. Now Annie, aged about seventeen, and a boy of fourteen, are all that remain of the family. The poor girl has been in Muskoka, boarding at a private house, waiting to be admitted. She returned here last week, and within twenty-four hours of her return her father dropped dead in his buggy while driving into Norwood. The case is surely one that must appeal to the sympathies of everyone and yet I fear, only one of the many that are constantly coming under your notice."

THE GREAT CHARITY.

THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN, TORONTO.

It Takes Care of Every Sick Child in Ontario Who Cannot Afford to Pay for Treatment.

The Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, is not a local institution—it is Provincial.

The sick child from any part of Ontario whose parents cannot afford to pay for treatment has the same claim and the same privileges as the Toronto child born within sight of its walls.

This is the reason that the Trustees appeal to the fathers and mothers of Ontario—for as their money goes out to help the Hospital so the Hospital's money can go out to help the children.

This is the 23rd year of the Hospital's life. The story of the years is a wonderful one—for in that period 10,000 children have been treated, and over 3,000 cured and 3,000 improved.

Last year there were 868 boys and girls in its beds and beds, and of these 495 were cured and 247 improved.

In three years the patients from different parts of Ontario, not Toronto, average 250—nearly a third of the entire number.


In six years 1,490 outside patients have been treated—and for 20 years past they will average 100 a year.

The average stay of every patient was 64 days, the cost per patient per day 94c.
