ABUSING WITNESSES.
The recent trial of the Hyams brothers—the greatest ever known in Canada—has been productive of surprises, including in that category the excessive license of counsel. It pained fair-minded men to read the language used in abusing witnesses. Nothing so bad would have been allowed in any of the Superior Courts in England. It is often the painful duty of lawyers to expose the contradictions and worse of witnesses, but when a witness, for the protection of society, does his plain and often painful duty in stating the facts, it is highly improper to denounce him as learned counsel did in more than one instance. It may be assumed as a fact that in almost all cases of murder the prisoner's lawyer knows the truth, either from actual confession or from a close scrutiny of the facts. It is very necessary that such should be the case, because when he learns that his client is guilty he knows what rocks and hidden dangers there are to be avoided. We believe the strict etiquette of the English bar to be that the prisoner's advocate should not personally pledge himself for the innocence of his client. His duty is to do his best for him, but he should avoid downright falsehood which would very commonly be the case if he made it a practice to personally vouch for his client. Many years ago Lord William Russell was murdered by Couvrouisier, his Swiss valet. A Mr. Phillips, an eminent Irish lawyer, defended the prisoner. Although the latter had confessed to Phillips, yet counsel actually tried to put the crime upon one of the maid servants. He was severely blamed for it at the time, and it is reasonably certain if such a thing occurred again that the offender would be disgraced. The public must be protected, which will not be the case if it is to be understood that witnesses are to be so dealt with.—Mail and Empire.

EDITORIAL NOTES.
The Prince of Wales held a levee Monday. There was a large attendance and the function was a brilliant one.
The United States Supreme Court on Monday denied the application of Eugene V. Debs, the strike leader for a writ of habeas corpus, and he will have to serve out his sentence.
The Ottawa Citizens says that there is very little hope of a compromise in the Manitoba school question as the result of the Governor-General's intervention. Premier Greenway declines to go further than to promise to introduce an act in the Provincial Legislature providing for the complete secularism of the schools.
The Hyams brothers, now in goal awaiting their second trial on the charge of murdering William C. Wells, are both in very good health, considering the mental strain they underwent during the progress of the trial. Yesterday afternoon Mrs. Dallas T. Hyams, who is staying for the present at the Queen's hotel, visited the goal, and had an interview with her husband. Mr. T. W. Horn, who is solicitor for the brothers, was also present. Mr. Horn says the defence is quite ready for a new trial, and will insist on the case being disposed of at the Autumn Assizes. He speaks hopefully of the prospects of the second trial.

At a dinner given at Spencerwood on her Majesty's birthday, Lieutenant-Governor Chapleau, in proposing the toast of the evening, made a speech of more than usual eloquence. His concluding words were as follows:—"To the health of the admirable woman whose feast we celebrate to-night, the honor of her sex, the glory of her people, and the example for Royalty—to our gracious Sovereign, who has accorded to us the fullest religious freedom, freedom of association, liberty of the press, and political liberty in its broadest sense, and kept but one thing for herself—the right of requiring from her subjects their affection and loyalty, and we tender these to her as freely as she has given Canada the liberties which it has enjoyed under her reign. May the Almighty long save her to the love of her subjects and to the admiration of the universe of which she is one of the greatest personalities. To her gracious Majesty Queen Victoria."

Dr. Robt. Buchanan, the convicted wife murderer, was brought before the Court of Appeals in Albany Monday, and was re-sentenced for the third time to the electric chair. It is believed that legal ingenuity has been now exhausted, and that the man will be executed the first week in July.

Before the Prison Labour Committee of the British Board of "Mr. Thornton, L. C. C., who for fifteen years has carried on the Old Kent road the business of a brush manufacturer, informed the committee that that industry, so far as England was concerned, had been nearly put to an end by foreign competition, which had resulted in brushes being placed on the market at prices with which manufacturers who had to employ free labour could not possibly compete."
