BURNED TO DEATH. On Saturday night a shocking accident occurred at Centreville, South Monaghan, by which the 15 months old child of Mr. James T. C. Lang, postmaster and store-keeper, lost his life. Mr. and Mrs. Lang were both busily engaged in the store attending upon their customers. The store and house all in the same building, but the door between them was closed. The baby was asleep in its cradle in the dining room under the charge of a hired girl about 18 years of age. She thought she would slip out for a few minutes and did so without the knowledge of Mr. or Mrs. Lang. It is supposed that in closing the door she awoke the child, and that it sat up in the cradle and pulled the cover from a table near by, bringing down and shattering the coal oil lamp right beside and under its cradle. The noise was not heard and the fire must have been burning about three minutes when Mrs. Lang heard the baby scream. She rushed into the room and found it in flames, the cradle and child being completely enveloped. She picked it up and rushed from the room with the flames still issuing from its clothing. Dr. Montgomery was telephoned for and arrived in five minutes. Everything that could be done for the child was done, but its case was hopeless. The doctor expected it would live only two hours, but it lingered eighteen.

The flames had gained considerable headway in the room, but it being Saturday night, there was an unusually large crowd of people around, at the house and the furniture were saved. The shock was a very severe one to Mrs. Lang. The girl who was said to be in a low state yesterday from shock and fright. LATER.—We are pleased to learn the girl referred to has been exonerated from all blame, as she had been granted leave of absence. We extend to Mr. and Mrs. Lang our heartfelt sympathy in their terrible affliction. Mr. Lang and the Ed. of the Mirror attended school together in Millbrook some years ago.

Good Words for Col. Sam.

The Montreal Daily Star of last Saturday has the following: In a letter to the Adelaide (S. Australia) Observer, Major W. T. Keay wrote: "I Naauw Poorts who should I find as press censor but my friend Col. Sam Hughes, M.P. for North Victoria in the Canadian House of Commons. Him I first met at the Jubilee celebrations in London, and he visited Melbourne towards the end of the same year (1897). The soldier-legislator is a man of many parts, and his services are being largely availed of the war authorities, principally in works of organization. Not only was he press censor at Naauw but also railway staff officer, and a variety of other things. A busy man, who never forgets that he is a colonial, and whose pride in the Canadians' skill leaves him a warm admirer of soldiers from Australia. To this officer I am indebted for many courtesies, as, indeed, is any Australian for whom he has an opportunity of doing a friendly turn."

A Little Known Postal Rule.

One of the regulations of the Post Office Department, and one which is not generally known, and consequently not frequently taken advantage of by the public, is the special delivery in cities. All that is required to use the service is the placing of a special delivery stamp on the envelope, these stamps being obtainable at any post office for ten cents. The postmaster receiving all such letters places them on the top of the registered letter package and they are sent in the regular way. At the place of delivery the postmaster is required, according to postal regulations, to receive first from the incoming mails the registered letters, no matter what time of the day or night it may be, then if there is a special delivery letter on the package it is immediately delivered by a special messenger. It will be seen that this is a very convenient and valuable service, and would often be the means of saving an additional expenditure by telephoning or telegraphing.

Conductor Bounoy's Bereavement.

Port Hope Guide, Saturday: The funeral services of Elbert R., son of Conductor K. Bounoy, were completed in Toronto yesterday. A short service was held at the home of Mr. Love, 350 Adelaide-st., west, where the body was taken from Port Hope on Thursday, and its interment took place at Mount Pleasant cemetery. There was a very large attendance of friends and relations, showing the esteem in which the family were held. Conductor Bounoy, during the many years of his service on the Grand Trunk, has become a favorite with the travelling public, who deeply sympathize with him and Mrs. Bounoy in their great bereavement. The floral tributes were most beautiful.

The Music of the War.

Sergeant McCrea's letters are appreciated by a wide circle of readers. An extract from his last letter, headed "The Music of Active Service," was copied from the Mirror into the Montreal Daily Star of Saturday last, as follows: "Sergt. John McCrea, of the 1st Canadian Contingent, writes to his sister in Omemee, Ont.: "Concerts and music being mentioned remind me of the kind of music I have been listening to lately. There is a Mauser—the high soprano; Martini—the contralto; Vickers-Nordenfeldt—tenor (he is great on runs) Krupp and Howitzer—bassos. I did not enjoy the series of concerts much, but I was very much pleased to hear the bassos on one occasion, when the tenor was too prominent. Another class was the march music, the swish, swish, of the infantry's feet through the grass, the clatter of cavalry, the conglomeration of transport sounds, and the loud metallic ring of the artillery. Bigpipes sole accompanist. Then there is a grand round of thousands of voices of man and beast, and the noise of picks, shovels, axes, kettles, fires, etc., when we pitch camp. I think these will live on my memory forever. But what do you think was the sweetest music I heard since I left home? It was the Chorus of Church Bells, Sunday morning."
