The Lindsay Post with its usual inaccuracy and mud slinging propensities, styles the opposition leaders as fourth rate men. Never mind, Mr. Post, whether they are fourth rate or twenty-fourth, they are fast enough to number you and the Ross-Stratton people among the "also ran," on the 29th of May next.

It is amusing to see the way the government officials in this section are jumping around these days. It is noticeable that they are the chief campaigners which Mr. Heyd has. "We do not believe in the motto, "To the victors belong the spoils," but where a government official makes himself a partisan at election time let him take warning.

A new feature has developed in the local campaign. Mr. Heyd, thinking that he might induce some of the temperance people in this section, is sending them special temperance literature, and also personal letters, asking the recipient to attend his meeting here in the near future. Many of the Reform papers are beginning to worry themselves over the trouble Mr. Whitney will have in forming a Cabinet. We are pleased to see that the fact that the Opposition Leader will be called upon to name a cabinet in the near future is beginning to dawn upon our opponents. That in itself is a mild confession of weakness. Never mind, friends, J. P. Whitney will have material to form half a dozen Ministries equal to the aggregation that now professes to govern this Province.

He came! He saw! He conquered! Such appears, in short, the history of Mr. Whitney's tour in New Ontario. From Huntsville to the Soo was one series of ovations, the like of which had never been tendered to a political leader in that new country before. It was in striking contrast to the frosty reception tendered to the Cabinet Ministers a few days before. "Whitney will win," is the watchword in New as well as Old Ontario.

Can Mr. Heyd advance one good substantial reason why he should supercede the late member in this riding? The only reason with any shadow of fact about it is that he wishes to assist his old friend, Stratton. Well, if he wishes to do that, let him go some place else, and not expect the electors of East Victoria to pay his political debt to the Provincial Secretary. What has Mr. Stratton ever done for us that we should elect his nominee? We owe Hon. James nothing, and we will bring it very forcible before him when he resurrects his candidate, here, from the avalanche of ballots which will be cast against him on polling day.

The following letter to the Minden Echo, throws some light upon the methods used by the Grits to gain votes but the people of the north country are not so ignorant, as the heeblers of the Grit machine, would make them out, as the following letter will prove.

DEAR SIR,—Will you kindly allow me space to contradict a rumor sent broadcast over this Township, that my sons and myself intended to vote for the Reform Candidate, at the approaching election, which is absolutely false, and intended to deceive the Electors of Stanhope. Topic for May 21st: Practical Consideration.

What happens when a piece of metal has stamped upon it the impression of a nation's king? A minute before it was mere metal, gold or silver or copper. But now it has become a part of the government, and the entire force of the nation, if necessary, is back of it to maintain its purity and protect it from injury.

So it is with a soul that is consecrated to the service of God. A day, a minute, before, it was an ordinary soul, ready for any employment. Now it has been taken up into the life of the kingdom of God, and all the power of that kingdom is back of it.

Before the metal received the impress it might be used for many purposes. Its destiny might have been to form a wise cup, or the setting for some rich jewel. Now it has become dedicated to a single service. It represents wealth. It transfers value.

So the Christian, as soon as he is consecrated to the kingdom of God, adopts practically only a single service. All his tasks are subsidiary to this one task—to transmit the Christ life, the value of it, the royal worth of it—from man to man.

If the newly made coin is injured or defaced, if a piece is taken out of it and used for some other purpose, its value as a coin is destroyed, it will no longer "pass." So it is with the consecrated life, when part of it is used for the service of the world. We cannot serve two masters, God and mammon. The very word "consecrated" means wholly-segregated.

There are counterfeit coins, of course—coins that weigh as much as the others and have the same ring, perhaps, and the same appearance; but they do not contain the same amount of metal, or, at any rate, they were not stamped by the government. They are worthless, and it is a crime to use them.

And so, of course, there are counterfeit consecrations, and sometimes they deceive even the counterfeiters themselves. But they never deceive God.

THE HISTORY OF OMEMEE.

The following is an essay by Charles Coltrane, a pupil of Room 1, of Omemee Public School.

If we turn to the map of Ontario, we will find marked in the County of Victoria and Township of Emily, a place called Omemee.

This pleasant little village, beautifully situated among the hills with a stream flowing through it, is what I intend to try and relate the history of.

The first settlers that came to Omemee were Morris Cottingham and his sons, William and Samuel, who built a shanty, in the year 1818, on or near the place, where the Methodist Church now stands.

The first white man that ever crossed Pigeon River was Samuel Cottingham, who did so by felling a tree across and walking on it till he reached the other side.

The English and Laidley families came to settle here about the same year. These pioneers had no place to get provisions nearer than Port Hope, so Morris Cottingham went up to Mr. Nebo, and with a hammer and chisel hewed out two rough mill-stones, with which to grind his grain. Next year he built and opened, the first grist mill north of Port Hope.

He and his sons were appointed by the Government to erect forty shanties for other settlers, who each received a grant of fifty acres and provisions etc., for two years.

The first store was erected in 1820 by Mr. C. Knowlton. Among the next settlers were Mr. Richard Davidson, Mr. Thos Crawford, Mr. Parker, Messrs. Thus, and William Matchel, Mr. Thos. Stephenson (Sr.) Mr. Wm. Beatty and Robt. Grandy, the father of the present Post Master, who held that office for over fifty years.

County, under the skillful management, of Mr. Shaw and others.

The present tannery has been run by the Lamb family for over fifty years, and during this period, both building and business have been greatly increased.

This village was first called Williamsburg in honor of Mr. William Cottingham, afterwards Medcalf, but on account of there being another Medcalf, it was finally decided in 1865 to call the village Omemee, which means in Indian Pigeon.

The first newspaper was established in 1857, under the name of "The Medical Warder," but the paper was removed to Lindsay in 1865. Soon afterwards another was published. A paper has been kept up ever since.

The three denominations English, Presbyterian and Methodist, all erected churches in the early history of Omemee, and since then have improved and enlarged them. The Salvation Army has also a barracks here, and is doing good work.

St. Pierre Disaster.

Fully 30,000 Lost Their Lives.

Fort de France, Island of Martinique, May 13—It now seems to be generally admitted that about 30,000 persons lost their lives as a result of the outbreak of the Mont Pelee volcano, at St. Pierre, on Thursday last.

Briefly put, last Thursday morning, the city of St. Pierre disappeared within 10 minutes in a whirling cyclone of fire vomited from Mt. Pelee; thirty thousand persons were instantly and horribly killed, and the volcano, whose ancient crater had been occupied by a quiet lake, in high-pitched paroxysms, suddenly discharged a torrent of fiery mud, which rolled towards the sea, engulfing everything before it. Then the last of cable communications was broken and the doomed city was isolated from the world.
