CAVAN COUNCIL.

Council Chamber, Cavan, Monday, May 16th, 1904.
The Council met at 10.30 o'clock this day, by call of Reeve.
Members all present. The Reeve presiding.
The minutes of the last meeting were read, approved and signed.
The following communications were read, viz:
From Thos Poast, refusing to accept the office of overseer of highway.
From the Carswell Co., Toronto, respecting A Municipal Manual.
From Good Roads Machinery Co., Hamilton.
From John E. Belcher, Peterboro, in answer to note from Clerk respecting filing his affidavit, as engineer, with Clerk.
From Women's Institute asking the usual grant of \$5.
All of which communications were left on the table except the last one.
Moved by Coun Shield, sec. by Coun Staples, that the Millbrook and Cavan Branch of the Women's Institute of East Durham be given the usual grant of \$5.—Carried.

Coun Staples reported respecting wire fences which he and Coun Shield were a committee to look after on con. 12, and agreed to give Chas Lough 30c per rod (to be removed the brush), and Thos McIndoo 25c per rod toward wire fences, and he reported that a culvert had gone away on 11th con., west of where large bridge was built last year, and he notified Geo Dainard, overseer, to put in a new culvert using old timber left from bridge built last year.

Coun Shield reported respecting a small bridge on diverted road opposite lot 5, con. 23, and Jos Shield fixed it for \$1.

Coun Kelly reported that he is instructed Wm Elliott to build a small bridge on 8th con opposite lot 3.

On motion Chas Lough was heard respecting a wire fence which he refused building for the grant given by committee.

On motion Jas Fee was heard; he wants to get grader on the road in his division, when working in that part, which will be allowed.

On motion J D Thexton was heard respecting his road division, and he was instructed to use his own grader where he put in the road work, subject to Coun Shield, commissioner in that part.

Moved by Coun Shaw, seconded by Councillor Shield, that Councillors Staples and Kelly be a committee to engage teams for grader.—Carried.

Arthur Armstrong on east half lot 11, con 3, was appointed overseer of highway for division No. 7 1/2, cons 3 and 4, west of M R., and John Patton on Lot 1, Con 2, was appointed overseer of highway on west boundary, con 2, Division No 46 1/2, by Coun Shaw, commissioner in that part.

To ensure attention all Municipal and Board of Health communications must have the signature, in full, of the persons sending them.

A SAD CASE.
The following letter, addressed to the Secretary of the National Sanitarium Association, Toronto, from the Rectory, Norwood, Ont., and signed by Rev. J. McKee McLennan, a well-known Anglican minister of the province, needs no comment of ours. It reads: "I desire to secure the admission into the Free Hospital for Consumptives at Gravenhurst of a young woman, a member of my parish. The case is a very sad one, and if help can at once be given, a promising life can be saved. Three years ago the mother died of consumption. Since that time it has been my painful duty to bury two of the sons with the same disease. Now Annie, aged about seventeen, and a boy of fourteen, are all that remain of the family. The poor girl has been in Muskoka, boarding at a private house, waiting to be admitted. She returned home last week, and within twenty-four hours of her return her father dropped dead in his buggy while driving into Norwood. The case is surely one that must appeal to the sympathies of everyone, and yet, I fear, only one of the many that are constantly coming under your notice."

MOTHER OF FOUR CHILDREN.

The trustees, secretary, and other officers of the Free Hospital for Consumptives at Muskoka are daily in receipt of many piteous letters.

A few days since Mr. W. J. Gage, of Toronto, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the National Sanitarium Association, received a letter from a resident of Quebec, pleading for the admission of a victim of the dread white plague, living about a hundred miles south-east of Montreal, and asking if it were not possible to admit her into the Free Hospital. The writer says: "The applicant is a Mrs. Wm. Paterson, the mother of four children and the wife of a farmer in a place called Goshon, in the township of Windsor. The doctor says that her left lung only is troubled. She is able to go about, but her appetite is very bad. I believe if she could be admitted into the Free Hospital for Consumptives she might be cured. She could not pay much, if anything. Kindly let me know if you could receive her."

We are told by Mr. Gage that applications for admission to the Free Hospital reach the secretary from all points in the Dominion, and patients have been received from Prince Edward Island on the east to Alberta on the west. Two hundred and twenty-five patients have been admitted in eighteen months, and not a single patient has been refused because of his or her poverty.
We can hardly think of any charity that appeals more pathetically for the support of the Canadian people.
