**SEMON BY BROTHER, THE REV. JOHN M. GARRETT.**  
The Organizing Idea of the Sermon, "CHARITY."

"Above all these things put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness."—Col. III, 14.  
Christianity, as a system, embraces the doctrines and precepts taught by Christ and exemplified in His life. All teaching in accordance with these precepts, is essentially a part of the system of Christianity. All organizations whose foundation principles are the precepts and doctrine of the Bible, and have for their object the elevation of man as a moral intelligent being are a part of Christianity. Such is the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A.; also the A. F. & A. M. There are two ways by which man may approach nearer in semblance to the Divine: 1st. The slow but more sure method explained by Huxley, by Science, and by many other educators and practised by the youthful Jewish shepherds who later on sang "The heavens declare the glory of God and the firmament sheweth his handiwork; day unto day uttereth speech and night unto night sheweth forth knowledge of Him." make us more reverent, humble and obedient. The book of Nature is open before us. By studying the marvellous works of the Great Architect of the Universe, we shall not only admire and adore but we shall grow in knowledge of Him and in likeness to Him.  
3rd. Sudden conversion. Let here, quite as much as in the slower method, a knowledge of God is needed to make us love, honor and worship Him; and to enable us to build a character having resemblance to the perfect character of Christ.  
We see then that the acquisition of knowledge of the divine character is necessary in either method in order that men shall rise higher and higher as moral intelligent creatures.  
Let us now consider who is a moral man. Is he who merely prays and professes? Is it he who gives his tongue for \$500, in behalf of some religious object and who the same evening has allowed the devil to lead him to the poverty within his threshold? Is he who keeps within the law but who takes advantage of ignorance or innocence or weakness to add to his riches? Is the poor and the lowly do not call such a man a moral man but him who is large hearted, generous, in one word charitable; him whose sympathy embraces all whether they rejoice or weep, and whose generosity is as large as his sympathy. The aim of morality is to develop man with such a character and to that end all things out of charity which is the bond of perfectness. This is the crowning virtue of a noble character. Strive to build such a character; so shall you like to Him whose character only is perfect. Finally in all things be spiritually minded.  
After divine service the brethren returned to their lodges and passed resolutions of thanks to the Rev. brother for his appropriate sermon; to the choir for equally appropriate music; and to the band for their excellent music and their assistance in making the procession as enjoyable as imposing.
