London, June 22.—(Special).—Queen's weather prevailed to-day. The morning was cloudy and overcast, but immediately before the Queen started there was a burst of sunshine, and it was bright and cheerful for the rest of the day. The heat was rather unusual, and the ambulances were busily employed in carrying hundreds to their homes and hospitals who were prostrated.

There were several slight accidents, and a rather serious one in which Lord Howe was the sufferer. He was riding fifty yards in rear of her Majesty's carriage when his horse reared and he was thrown heavily to the ground. He was taken to Guy's hospital, where it was found he had concussion of the brain.

Millions are in the streets to-night viewing the illuminations and singing patriotic songs. It is a thoroughly good-natured crowd, and can be handled by the police without any trouble.

The Winnipeg crew were on the Colonial grand stand to-day, and took a keen interest in the gorgeous procession.
