The War Summary.

Admiral Sampson is said to have forced the harbor at Santiago, blowing out the Merrimac, sunk last week and attacked Cervera's ships, sinking two of them.

The monitor Monterey and collier Brutus sailed from San Francisco yesterday for Manila.

Admiral Dewey officially reports that the insurgents in the Philippines have scored several victories over the Spanish and have taken prisoners fifty officers and 1,800 men.

Reports regarding the military occupation of Santiago are conflicting, but on the whole there is reason to believe that 5,000 United States troops have effected a landing in the vicinity of the city.

United States officers who were in the battle of Manila have arrived at San Francisco and give a graphic story of the affair.

Despatches from the Philippines indicate that the native auxiliaries of the Spanish are deserting by hundreds and Manila will likely soon fall into the hands of the rebels.

The Spanish Minister of Foreign Affairs has sent a note to the different powers of Europe declaring that the United States violated international law by capturing Spanish vessels before a declaration of war and in other respects.

Various persons held under United States laws for filibustering in Cuba before the outbreak of the war were discharged yesterday.

A disguised Spanish spy endeavored to take Commodore Schley's squadron into Santiago harbor with the supposed object of having the ships blown up by the submarine mines.—Globe.

Scalded to Death.

Kingston, Ont., June 5.—The two-year-old son of Mrs. William Kemp, Division street, was yesterday left with Mrs. Gallivan, a neighbour, while the mother went to market. The child was playing about the house, and in some way tumbled into a tub of boiling water. Before the accident was discovered the boy was so badly scalded that death resulted in a few hours.—Mail and Empire.

Killed by "X" Rays.

Midleton, N. Y., June 4.—Patrick J. Hardy, who was examined under "X" rays at Leominis sanitarium a few months ago, and who claimed that his flesh, skin, and internal organs were shrivelled under the exposure, is dead. He was confined to his bed, and brought suit for \$20,000 against the sanitarium. Three weeks ago he was removed to the county almshouse, where he died.—Mail and Empire.
