To Clean Tinware.—If new tinware is rubbed over with fresh lard, then thoroughly heated in the oven before it is used, it will never rust afterwards, no matter how much it is put into water. If the tea pot or coffee pot is discolored on the inside, boil it for a short time in a solution of borax and all its brightness will return.

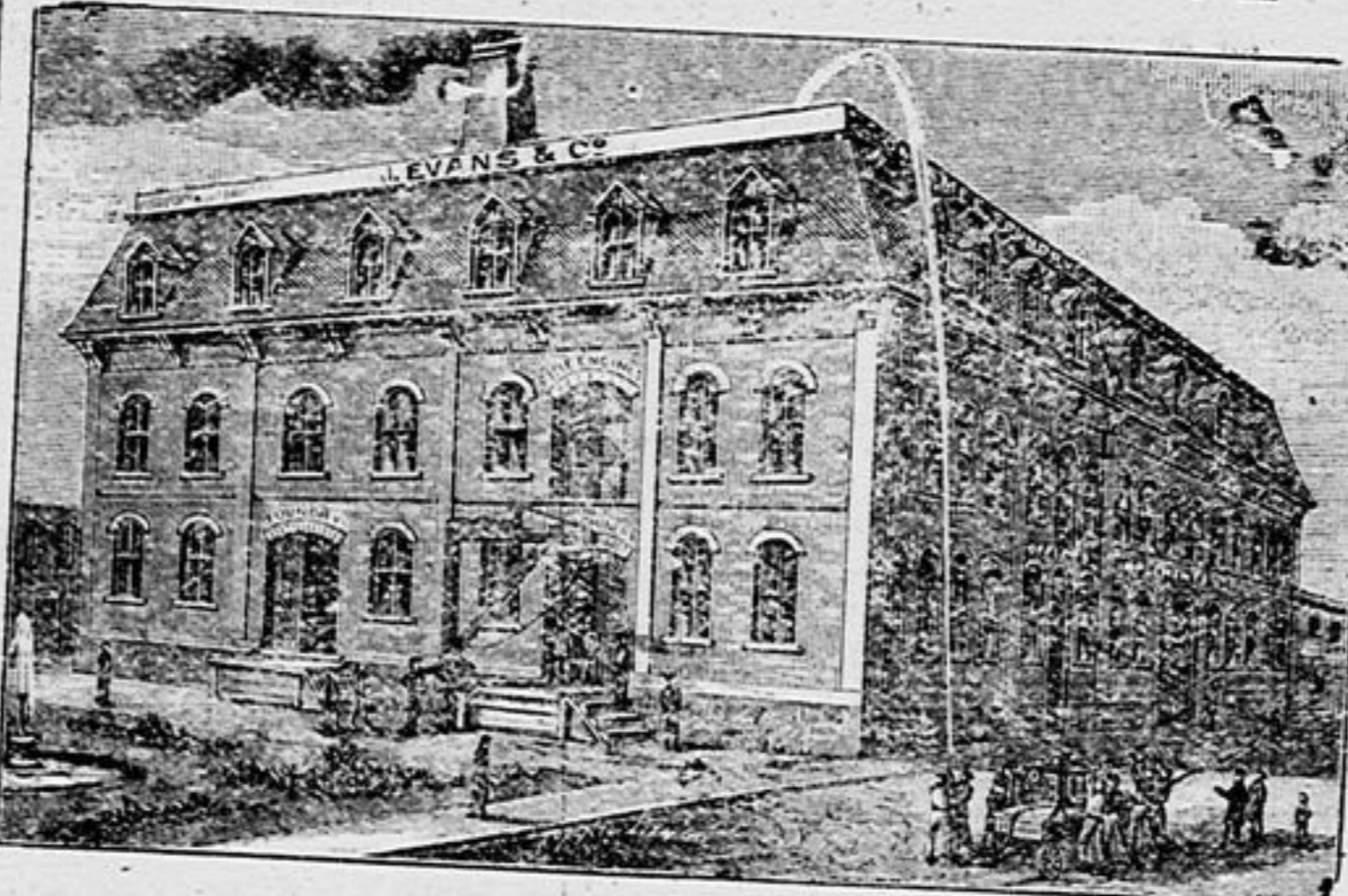

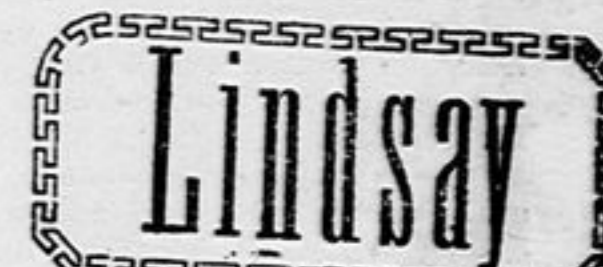

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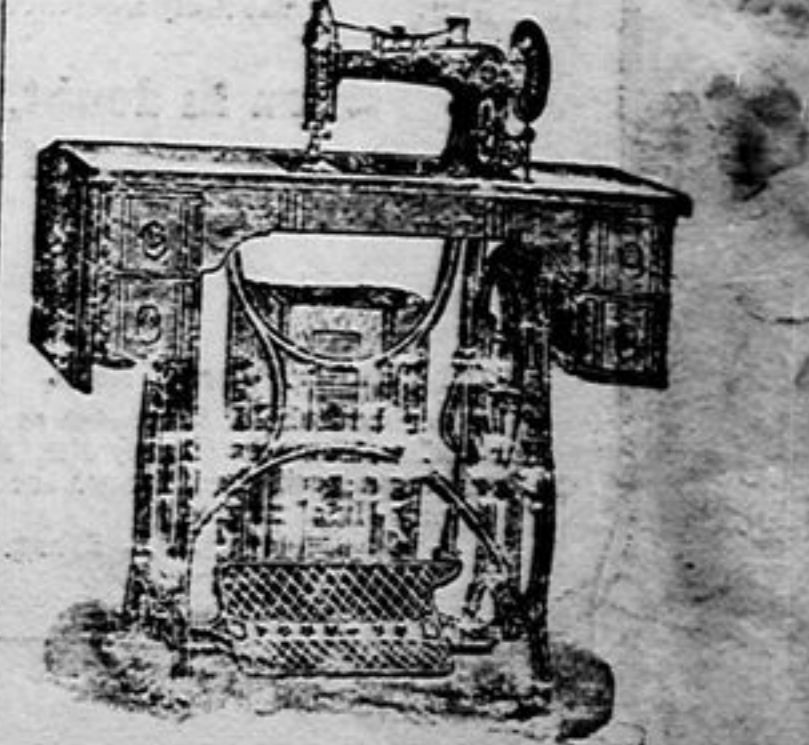
