## SPACE FOR TWO JONAHS

WHALE'S STOMACH IS LARGE ENOUGH TO HOLD THEM.

Scientists Agree That Monster Cachalot Is Fully Equal to the Task.

Did the whale swallow Jonah? The question, which has been the subject of so much dispute, has been revived and government scientists by the expedition to Newfoundland in pursuit of a finback whale.

The whale sought is the biggest of several species of finback whales. It is the largest animal now existing on the earth. But was it the particular kind of cetacean that ate Jonah?

Science, with the data now at hand, has been able to sift the matter to some extent, and as one might say, to boil down the evidence. As a result the fact may be considered as definitely established that, notwithstanding the widespread incredulity on the subject, an incredulity which has striven to classify the scriptural account as nothing inherently impossible in itself, the remote forebears of all modern whales lived and walked on dry land. Some of them actually swam and accommodated in its belly two Jonahs, if there had been a pair of them.

Accurate figures in regard to the capacity of a whale—the first published, and endorsed by the highest scientific authority—will give us presently. But meanwhile it is desirable to mention the fact that the Smithsonian expedition was organized and is directed by Dr. Frederic W. True, who has sent F. A. Lucas, a noted expert, to Balena Station, on the southeast coast of Newfoundland, with instruction to obtain at all hazards a cast of one of the monstrous cetaceans.

CASTING WHALE IN PLASTER. Mr. Lucas is now on the spot, and having secured the whale, is engaged in making a model of it. Having provided himself in advance with about 20 barrels of plaster of paris, fetched from St. Johns, he mixes the stuff with water in a sort of big of planks, such as masons use for similar purposes, and then pours it in buckets over the carcass.

The whale being about 90 feet long, with a weight of thirty tons, must be taken a bit at a time, working from tail to nose, in order to obtain a series of plaster sections, which, duly fitted together, shall represent the complete creature. The cast (a more shell, for the sake of lightness) will be a perfect reproduction of the whale, and, after being painted, will be the literal image of the original animal, even to the smallest detail.

Now, when it comes to the question whether this was the kind of whale that swallowed Jonah, science is inclined to a negative opinion. The throat of a finback whale, notwithstanding the enormous size of the animal, is so small that a man's arm could hardly be thrust through it. The creature is not a beast of prey; it feeds upon small crustaceans and other amphipods which float about at the surface of the sea. In short, a whale of gentle manners, and not at all of the sort that would absorb a prophet atgulp.

HAS SMALL GULLET.

The "right" or Greenland whale is the next biggest whale. It attains a length of 70 feet, and is the principal source of both whale oil and whalebone. But, of a certainty, it was not the whale that ate Jonah, inasmuch as it feeds, like the finback, upon tiny pelagic animals, and could not possibly swallow a man's leg, much less his whole body. Such a prodigious creature is it that it has not even any teeth, but sits its provender through a sort of screen, which is composed of a material known commercially as whalebone.

There are several other species of whales, most of them much smaller, and the available evidence points to the conclusion that the particular cetacean which took in Jonah, and swelled him up subsequently upon dry land, was none other than the sperm whale—an animal 60 feet long when full grown, of a predatory inclination, with a throat big enough to swallow a man, and possessed of a stomach of sufficient capacity to hold him. Such is called, which, under ordinary circumstances, feeds upon cuttlefish, the scriptural specimen mistook for a large cephalopod.

Dr. F. E. Beddoe, anatomist of the Zoological Society of London, has recently published an opinion to the effect that an adult sperm whale might without difficulty swallow a man. Of course, Jonah may have been a small man—some men are fully twice as big as others—and, if so, the problem appears more easily solved. The cachalot, be it frequently attacking the giant squid (a monstrous cuttlefish which has tentacles 50 feet long), and to suppose that he would balk at a human being, if hungry, is absurd.

PLenty of ROOM INSIDE.

Once down the throat of the whale Jonah found himself in a sort of spherical chamber, which a German

anatomist has called the "crop," and from which he passed on to the stomach proper, a fairly roomy place, cylindrical in shape and about three feet long by three feet in diameter. Of course he could not stand up, but he was able to lie down comfortably, and it may be supposed that he did not experience any painful inconvenience so long as his host chose to refrain from eating other things. A few cuttlefishes of large size might have been uncomfortable room mates.

There are two minor stomachs beyond the main stomach of the sperm whale, but it may be presumed that the whale made no attempt to explore them. Why the creature should possess so complicated a digestive apparatus nobody knows, but probably it is an inheritance from ancestors who were land animals. There is no doubt whatever that the remote forebears of all modern whales lived and walked on dry land. Some of them actually swam and accommodated in its belly two Jonahs, if there had been a pair of them.

The whale that swallowed Jonah had about 30 teeth in its lower jaw, some of them over 100 feet long and composed of the finest ivory. Indeed, the ivory which the cachalot carries in its mouth is excellent a quality as to command a high price in the market.
