GOD SAVE THE KING.

A Letter from Hugh Murray.

He Tells of the Big Snakes, Moose and other Game at Snake River.

The following extract from a letter just received from Mr. Hugh Murray, at present at Snake River, engaged in exploring the wild regions of Ontario which lie north of the Ottawa River, will no doubt be of great interest to Mirror readers. Mr. Murray, when here made an exhaustive study of snakes and their habits, as well as of other members of the oviparous and biped families, which make their homes along the shores of the Trent River and its tributaries. This technical knowledge gives him a comprehensive grasp of his subject and enables him to draw a vivid picture of the dangers encountered by the pioneer settlers in that great country. The C. P. R. has kindly placed at his disposal a private car so as to enable him to continue his work with as little inconvenience as possible. Mr. Murray's letter reads as follows:

I must not forget to tell you about the snakes at Snake River. There are 2 or 3 varieties and they often grow to enormous lengths ranging from 4 to 10 feet long. The Hoop Snake is the most dreaded and any person being out an hour or so before dusk runs a great risk of his life; at dark they seem to disappear. Of course you come across them during the day but you must be prepared to fight if necessary. Every person here carries a revolver and a short scythe-like weapon in his belt and some of the men are so expert that they can decapitate a snake every blow with little danger to themselves. The men all wear leather trousers, and scarcely ever do you see a woman out of doors. For home protection the farmers have taken advantage of the fact that hogs are very fond of killing snakes and at each corner of every cabin you will see a hog chained and it would do you good to see them bristle up and get in shape at the approach of a snake for they seem to know intuitively what they are there for. Thus they combine protection and profit as they get good prices for pork here in the shanties.

You know the country is very mountainous and for convenience in traveling the snake generally follows the railroad. They throw themselves into the shape of a hoop, hence their name; curling their tail around their neck with
