The Council met this day pursuant to adjournment at 11 o'clock a. m.

From the Millbrook and Cavan branch of the Women's Institute of East Durham, acknowledging with thanks the receipt of a grant of \$5.00 towards their Society.

From Manvers' Clerk, informing Cavan Council that Councilor Mc Cartney was appointed to meet a committee of Cavan Council and arrange about travelling on west boundary, south of Marsh Church and also inform the Council respecting the payment of Assessors for equalization of Union Schools and the amount Cavan owed the Assessors.

From John Belcher, Civil Engineer, Peterboro, sending his affidavit as Engineer of the Long Swamp Drain and Road, which has been filed in the Clerk's office.

From Biological department, Agricultural College, Guelph, respecting artesian wells in Cavan, and from Wm C Brent, Toronto, respecting Deben tures, both of which have been answered by the Clerk as instructed by the Council.

From Joseph Fisher, refusing to act as overseer of highway to which Div. Wm Dawson has been appointed as overseer by Coun Shaw, Commissioner in that part.

Reeve reported that he received a communication from Mr. Jackson, of S Menaghan respecting east boundary and he went to meet him, but he did not put in an appearance and he has been informed since that they have let a contract of \$160 for fixing road between Frazerville and Centreville.

Coun Staples reported that he let a job to J S Touchburn and J Tippet, of travelling on 11th Con. on Middle Road about 100 yds. at 45c. per yd.

Coun Shield reported that he met Wm Windrum, overseer on North Boundary, where he allowed him to spend \$15.00, and he saw Mr White about watering trough on 12th Con., west of Middle Road, and he allowed him \$5 towards putting in this trough, and he allowed Chas Lough, overseer, to spend \$50 on 12th Con. on Middle Road.

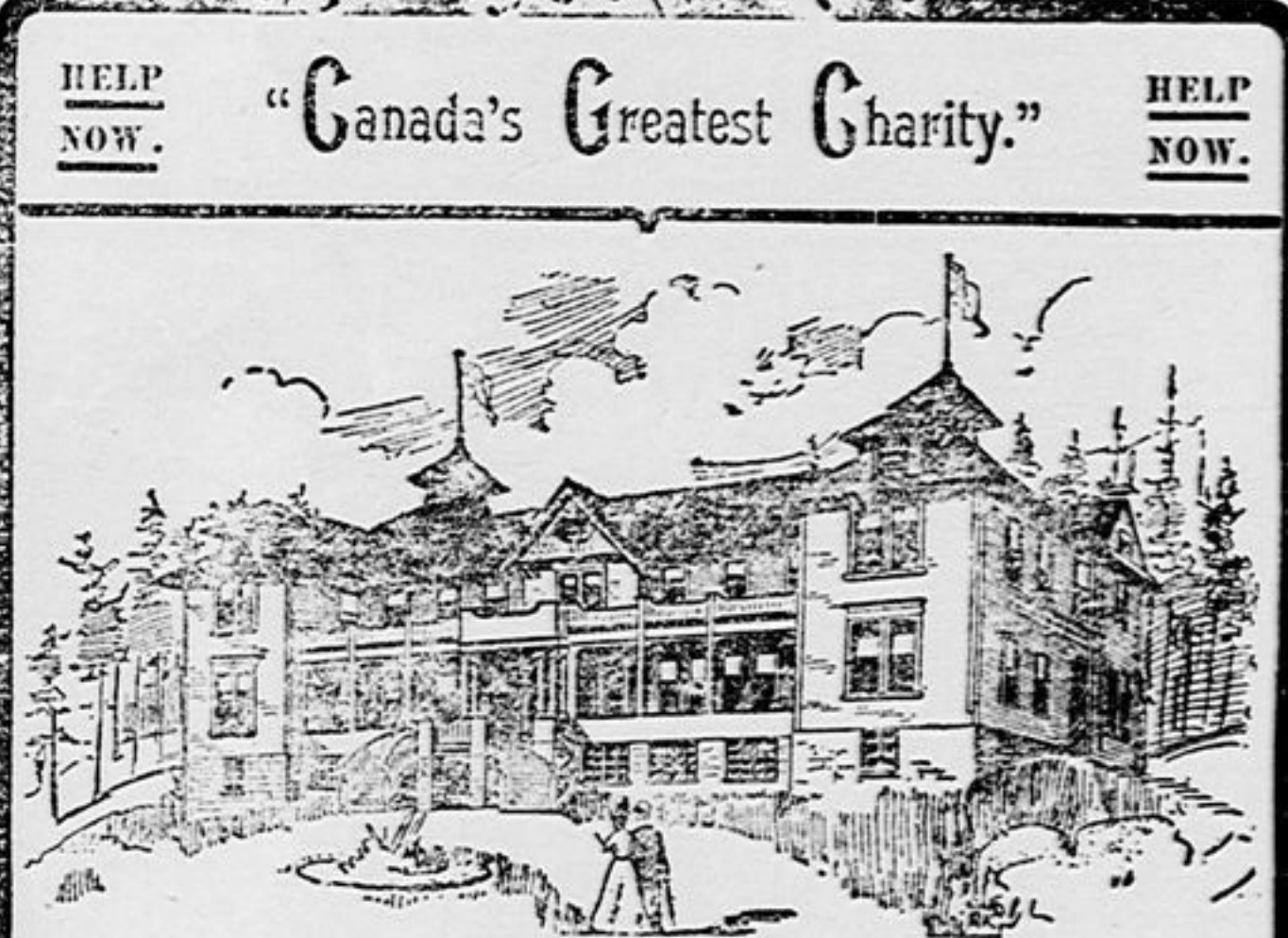

Funds Urgently Needed

The financial reports for the year just ending show that to keep the doors of the Free Hospital for Consumptives open, maintaining the number of patients for which accommodation has been provided, not less than \$25,000 is required for the year now entered upon.

Since the Free Hospital was opened (18 months ago) 224 patients have been received. The help the institution has been to these people—all from the wage-earning and poorer ranks of life—cannot be estimated in human language.

There is no endowment, excepting the provision made by three life insurance companies for six beds for the current year. Only by the continued contributions of the Canadian public can the work be maintained.

Patients are accepted from every part of the Dominion, and there have been in residence during the past year patients from Prince Edward Island on the east to the Northwest Territories on the west.
