In several departments considerable changes have been made and the premiums added to. A new Art Gallery and a new Administration Building are being erected and improvements made to the grounds. The famous Black Watch Band, by gracious permission of His Majesty the King, and of the colonel and officers of the gallant old "Forty-two," has been engaged and will play three times each day during the entire period of the exhibition. A number of other decidedly superior attractions have also been arranged for.
