The premiums to be distributed amount, including medals, plate and specials, to upwards of \$40,000 in value, of which \$35,000 is in cash. Field Marshal Lord Roberts, V.C., is expected to officiate at the opening ceremonies on Tuesday, Aug. 29, and to be a constant visitor during the first week. The famous band of the Irish Guards, considered the finest military musical organization in the United Kingdom, and the favorite household band of His Majesty the King, will give two concerts on the grounds daily. Pictures and art treasures loaned by the King (Abbey's great Coronation picture being included) the Corporation of the City of London, the Republic of France, South Kensington Museum, Right Hon. Lord Strathcona and Lieut.-Governor of Ontario, Hon. Mortimer Clarke, will contribute to the most magnificent and most historic display of art ever made on this continent. Entries close Aug. 15th. LITTLE HELPS.

To keep down the coal bills use up the "slack" which accumulates in every household, and at the same time utilize quantities of waste paper: Put the matter into a pail of water, let it steep a little, then squeeze into little balls. Place these on a clear, low fire of cinders (or coke will answer) On the balls throw coal dust, mixed with cinders. Leave the fire untouched for hours. When poked it lights up into a warm, glowing fire. This is a splendid way when a fire is required to be kept in all night.

Vinegar should not be kept in a stone jar, as the acid may affect the glazing and the vinegar be rendered unwholesome. Glass jars are the best vinegar receptacles.

Freshen the house by putting a few drops of oil of lavender in an ornamental bowl. Then half fill it with hot water. This will give a delightful freshness to the atmosphere.

A good china cement is made by mixing with a strong solution of gum arabic and water enough plaster of paris to make a thick paste. This should be applied to the broken edges with a camel's hair brush.

When lighting a gas stove it will often give a slight explosion and light wrong, thus causing no heat. Turn the gas off very quickly, and on again. It will then light properly without any further trouble.

If you have left boiled eggs in the water a little too long break the top of the shell at once by patting it with a spoon. This lets out some of the heat, and the hardening process is stopped immediately.

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A SAD CASE.

The following letter, addressed to the Secretary of the National Sanitarium Association, Toronto, from the Rectory, Norwood, Ont., and signed by Rev. J. McKee McLennan, a well-known Anglican minister of the province, needs no comment of ours. It reads: "I desire to secure the admission into the Free Hospital for Consumptives at Gravenhurst of a young woman, a member of my parish. The case is a very sad one, and if help can at once be given, a promising life can be saved. Three years ago the mother died of consumption. Since that time it has been my painful duty to bury two of the sons with the same disease. Now Annie, aged about seventeen, and a boy of fourteen, are all that remain of the family. The poor girl has been in Muskoka, boarding at a private house, waiting to be admitted. She returned home last week, and within twenty-four hours of her return her father dropped dead in his buggy while driving into Norwood. The case is surely one that must appeal to the sympathies of everyone, and yet, I fear, only one of the many that are constantly coming under your notice."
