The root of a freshly-extracted tooth covered with a delicate membrane called the "pericementum," the vitality of which materially assists the wished for combining of the tissues. Unless the granier is directly transferred, the vitality of this membrane must be artificially preserved.. One way of doing it is to graft the tooth temporarily into the comb of a cock, that part of the fowl being well fed with blood, as may be seen from its redness. When wanted for use, it is cut out. Ordinarily the patient is obliged to wait for a while until the dentist has a suitable tooth freshly extracted, unless he chooses to hire somebody to
