Don't Use Big Words.

In promulgating your esoteric cogitations and in articulating your superficial sentimentalities and amicable philosophical or psychological observations, beware of platitudinous ponderosity. Let your conversational communications possess a clarified conciseness, a compacted comprehensibility, a coalescent consistency, and a concatenated cogency. A Novel Scheme.

A new way of collecting old debts is being introduced in Maine towns. The introduction of the scheme is a novelty, too. A young woman of alleged great attractiveness is the advance agent, and between her own attractions and those of her scheme she is said to be having complete success. She calls on the local merchants and secures their membership in the new agency. A few days after her departure there appear in town a number of men dressed in bright green coats, who get the particulars of old debts and debtors from the members and then proceed to call on the victims. The contract provides that the horribly conspicuous collectors shall make fifteen calls a day on each creditor, meeting him anywhere and everywhere. The scheme is reported to be a big success, as most of the debtors are glad to make a prompt settlement rather than have the whole neighborhood see them haunted by the green-coated specter.

The Dead Letter Office.

From the report of the Postmaster-General some information is gleaned concerning an interesting branch of the public service—the dead-letter office. Altogether 1,036,853 communications came

under this head. By far the greater portion of these were restored to life or to their owners, which in official language amounts to the same thing. The dead letters containing articles of value numbered 10,483, and of these 78,522 were delivered eventually to the owners. There were 3,545 dead letters containing money, amounting to \$16,130. Among the contents of other dead letters were 556 checks, 230 drafts, 861 money orders, 300 promissory notes, 49 deeds, 12 baptismal certificates, 9 death certificates, 2 certificates of Methodist ordination, 2 certificates of the P. P. A., 13 baby dresses, 10 cakes, 1, chalice, 2 pieces of chewing gum, 1 church garment, 7 collars, 12 false teeth, 5 glass eyes, 23 insurance policies, 2 hotel licenses, 28 mortgages, 8 pawn tickets, 9 pills, 1 plaster, 1 rattle snake rattle, 1 box of corn salve, and 1 coffin plate.

RECIPES.

Jellied Prunes.—Soak one-half box of gelatine in one-half cup of cold water, cook one-half pound of prunes until soft in one quart of water. When they are done, drain them and cut in pieces, and pour the hot prune water over the gelatine, adding a cup of granulated sugar, rind and juice of one-half a lemon. To be eaten with whipped cream.

Cruellers.—Three eggs, six tablespoonfuls white sugar, butter size of a small egg, one-quarter teaspoonful saleratus dissolved in two tablespoonfuls of milk, flour to thicken.

Dressing for Cabbage and Lettuce.—Four tablespoonfuls vinegar, one tablespoonful salt, one tablespoonful mustard, one tablespoonful sugar. Put into dish of boiling water and add piece of butter size of an egg. Beat one egg and stir into this, which makes it thick; add cream to thin it a little and a pinch of cayenne pepper.

Sponge Cake.—One cup of sugar (not heaping), one cup flour, the grated rind and juice of one lemon, three fresh eggs beaten well; beat whites and yolks separately fifteen or twenty minutes. After stirring in the flour, put into an oven as soon as deep pan. One small loaf, bake in deep pan, and break the cake instead of cutting.

Vanilla Wafers.—One cup of sugar, two-thirds cup of butter, four tablespoonfuls milk, one tablespoonful vanilla, one egg, one and one-half teaspoonfuls cream tartar, two-thirds teaspoonful of soda, flour enough to roll out well; roll very thin.
