Who Is the Oldest Postmaster? POISON IVY. A Common Plant That Causes Skin Poisoning -How to Distinguish It From the Common Ivy. Look out for it; it is dangerous. There is little poison ivy in this vicinity, but it is to be found in some places. The poison ivy, or Toxicodendron, belongs to the hederella family and is a climbing plant with a woody stem and smooth, rather pretty, triplicate leaves. It is to be carefully avoided; contact with the leaves or, in the cases of many sensitive persons, the air blowing from the vines causes a troublesome cutaneous poisoning. Little clusters of pustules or blisters form on the skin causing great discomfort. The best remedy is perhaps to apply a properly qualified physician, though in country places where a doctor is not easily obtainable simple remedies are employed such as simply washing the pustules with buttermilk impregnated strongly with salt is a severe but reputedly effective remedy. Washing the parts with a solution of soda (bi-carbonate of soda) allays the irritation.

Many persons are subjected to danger of injury by not being able to recognize the poison ivy or distinguish it from the harmless ivy. The difference is easily perceived. The poison ivy is trifoliate or 3-leaved, while the harmless ivy is quinquifoliate or 5-leaved. The poison ivy grows freely in the Stony Lake and Rice Lake districts, and cottagers campers and tourists, especially those ignorant of the hurtful qualities, are liable to be poisoned. A little care will enable them to avoid the plant and perhaps very unpleasant or neglected or improperly treated is apt to be troublesome and dangerous if the vicinity of the eye is affected.
