The poison ivy, rhus toxicodendron, belongs to the hedera family and is a climbing plant with a woody stem and smooth, rather pretty, tripoliate leaves. It is to be carefully avoided; contact with the leaves or, in the cases of many sensitive persons, the air blowing from the vines causes a troublesome cutaneous poisoning. Little clusters of pustules or blisters form on the skin causing great discomfort. The best remedy is perhaps to apply to a properly qualified physician, furnished houses in Canada. The difference is easily perceived. The poison ivy is trifoliate or 3leayed, while the harmless ivy is quinquefoliate or 5-leaved. The poison ivy grows freely in the Stony Lake and Rice Lake districts, and cottagers campers and tourists, especially those ignorant of the hurtful qualities, are liable to be poisoned. A little care will enable them to avoid the plant and perhaps very unpleasant results. Poisoning by the ivy if neglected or improperly treated is apt to be troublesome and dangerous if the vicinity of the eye is affected.
