Nearly 2000 Boxes Offered this Morning but no Sales were made Owing to the Hot Weather.

The regular fortnightly meeting of the Victoria county cheese board was held this morning in the old opera house, owing to repairs in progress in the council chamber. Buyers Flavell, Whitton and Fitzgerald were present, also President Robertson, Secretary Eugene Shine, and other officials.

WEATHER INJURED BUSINESS.

President Robertson called for bids, whereupon Buyer Whitton pointed out that owing to the exceptionally warm weather it would be unsafe to ship cheese, and he suggested that the board adjourn for one week. Some salesman felt inclined to accept offers, fearing they would not have room in their factory to store the cheese, and Buyer Flavell offered 7 3/8c to those

who were in that position, naming a number of factories, but Minden was the only one that accepted.

Buyer Whitton pointed out that he was prepared to bid freely, but as he would not ship cheese while the weather was so warm it would be better for the factories to hold, as the market showed an upward tendency. A vote was then taken and the patrons decided to hold till next Monday, when the board will meet at 11 a. m.—Post.

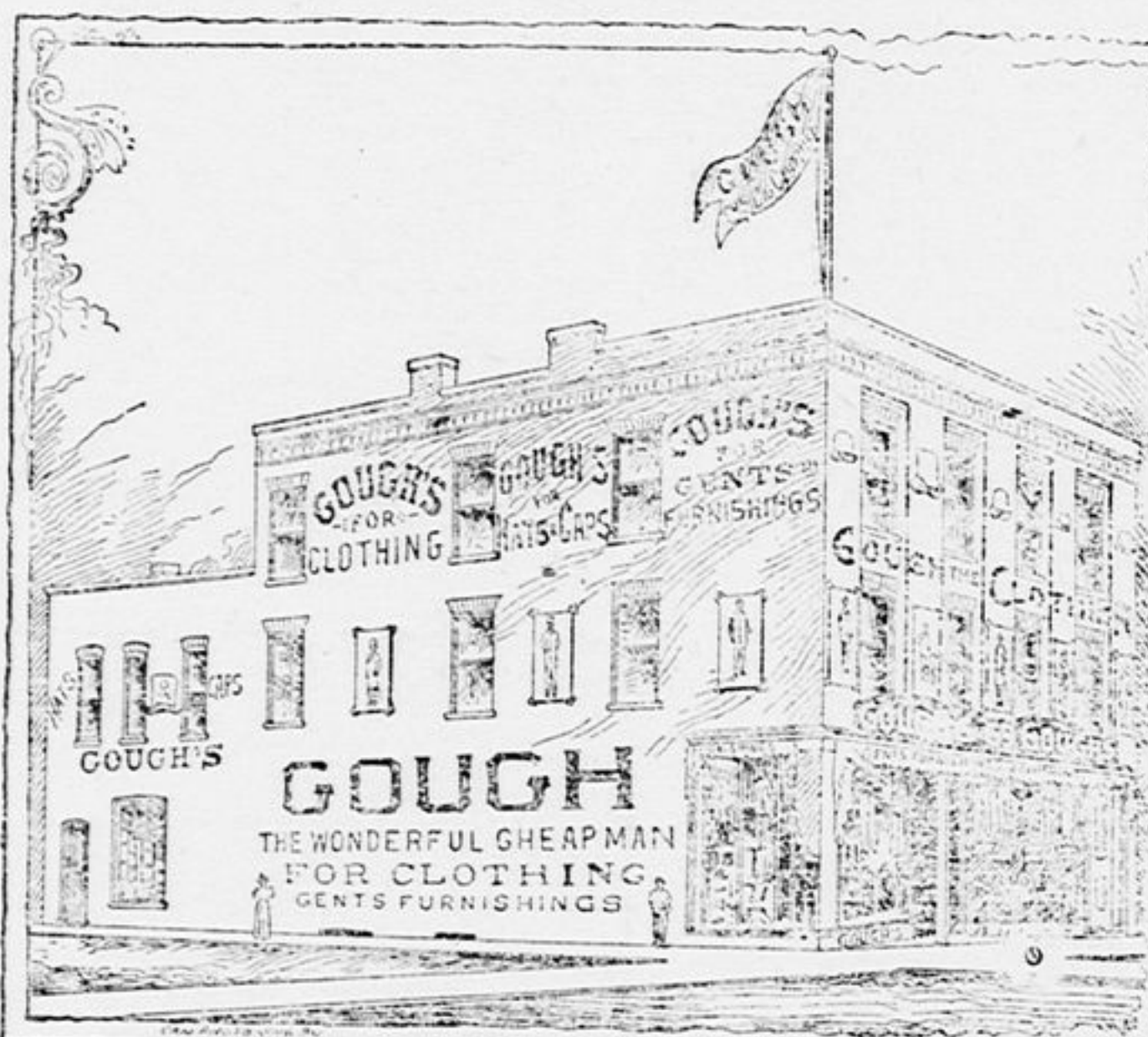

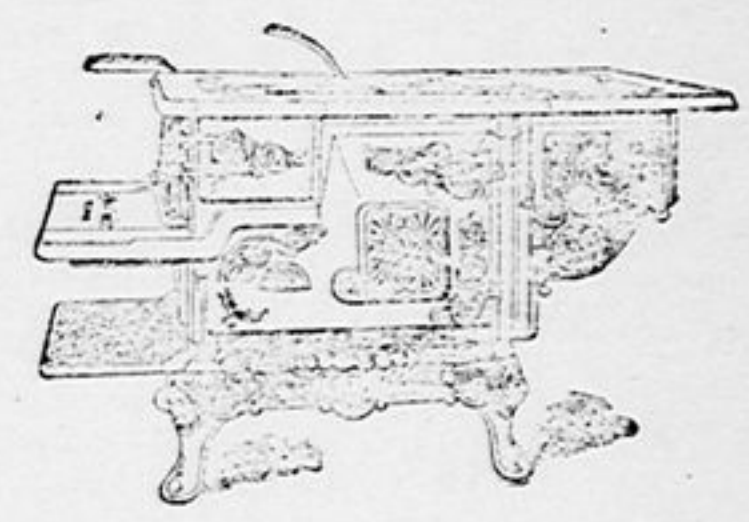
