Letter from Maj. Neill.

Written on Board the Cestrian.

VERY ROUGH WEATHER. Private Higgins Buried at Sea.

Number of the Horses Died.

Cestrian, May 28th. DEAR MOTHER,-

We are within 2 days of Cape Town. I suppose you know all about the transport leaving Halifax. We embarked on Cestrian at noon on May 8th. Had on board the 3rd and half of the 4th C. M. R., left the wharf at 3 p. m., with 750 men and officers, and \$00 horses, dropped down the harbor and sailed at 7 p.m. It was a beautiful evening. The scenery was grand as we sailed for the open sea. Soon the boat began to roll and the men to get below, as it was impossible to stay above. The officers all have cabins. I am with Dr. Murray and the quarter master, Mr Butcher. The staff always get the pick of quarters. We live well on board. It has been a delightful trip, only the wind has been blowing hard ever since we started and the boat rolling for days. The sailors say it is underground swell. All I know about it is, that you have to

There were a great number of the men sick when we started out first and very lew showed on deck. If they did come they lay around too sick to move, Mr G. W. Mulligan, of Peterborough but I am glad to say I never was sick an hour. Guess I had too much work to do. The only land we have seen since we started was Cape de Verde group. W signalled at Cape Vincent, but did not stop. The coasts of these Islands are barren and rocky, and they seem to be hundreds of feet high. There are quite a number of Islands around here with unspellable names, and of little importance, except as coaling stations, and the scenery which is grand. On Sunday have service in the morning. Col. Williams leads the service. I have always been too busy to attend.

It is all very fine satling when the sea is calm, byt excuse me in such weather as this. Two dogs got loose to-day and were washed overboard.

We have been in a storm now for days. It is a fine sight to see the sea, the waves are rolling mountains high. Loveto all. I remain,
