



Anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne RIGHT LOYALLY CELEBRATED IN LINDSAY.

Fully 10,000 People in Attendance.

The Largest Turnout of Orangemen Ever Witnessed in Victoria's County Town. The Celebration One of the Most Successful Ever Held in the Midland District.

The Glorious 12th of July Celebration, held at Lindsay on Saturday last, will long be remembered as one of the most magnificent that has ever taken place in the County. As early as 6 a.m. the beat of the drum gave notice that the morning of the 12th had arrived, and that preparations for spending the day in Victoria's County Town had already commenced.

Emily District, (if not the largest and best in the parade,) at least was as well represented, and in appearance equalled any other District present, and this is saying much, when it is considered that the Districts of four Counties were represented in the procession.

The Town of Lindsay threw open its gates and extended a right hearty welcome to all visitors. The splendid decorations of the town also added to the warmth of the reception, and did credit to the County Seat.

The Grand Trunk Railway Co. had made complete arrangements for handling large crowds from all points, and the numerous special trains arrived sharp on time, with every seat in the coaches occupied. Extra coaches were also attached to the regular trains, and in this way over 5000 visitors were handled in comfortable fashion and without mishap.

The task of feeding the multitude taxed the efforts of the hotel men and other caterers. It was past four o'clock when the last of the crowd finished dinner, and the waiters had little rest, because half an hour later those who dined early were clamoring for supper. Many ladies who could not face the wild rush for empty places at the hotel and restaurant tables sought and obtained needed refreshments at private houses, while the hungry men folk purchased supplies of cheese, bread and sardines at the nearest grocery and appeased the craving of their inner man on the spot.

On all sides might be heard expressions of admiration elicited by the fine appearance of Kent-st. The waving banners and flags gave the town a "glad-to-see-you" air that was thoroughly in keeping with the sentiments of the people as a whole towards the visitors.
