### Durham Old Boys Excursion to Niagara Falls

### Mr. Jas. McLean, Mt. Pleasant, Speaks in Glowing Terms of the Trip.

The annual excursion of the Durham  
Old Boys Association was held on the  
18th, to Niagara Falls. The Steamer  
Corona conveyed the party to Lew-  
iston, and the electric cars on the gorge  
route being the means of conveyance  
to the Falls. The Pres. and Sec. of  
the Association had previously ar-  
ranged for a visit to the power house  
and the prepared food Co's buildings.

Mr. Jas. McLean, of Mt. Pleasant,  
took in the trip, and in conversation  
with him he expressed himself as hav-  
ing enjoyed the visit exceedingly well.  
He said in part: The steamer left the  
wharf at Toronto at 9 a.m., with Piper  
Beeton and an Orchestral Band on  
board, also a live Pres. and Sec., who  
were interested in the welfare of the  
excursionists. As we entered the mouth  
of the Niagara River, the Pres, Mr J.  
L. Hughes, School Inspector, pointed  
out and explained the many places of  
interest where the American and Brit-  
ish Armies met in deadly conflict. The  
President was in his element while he  
was showing the party places where  
battles had been fought and victories  
won by our gallant soldiers. As soon  
as dinner was over the party was con-  
veyed in electric cars to the power  
house which is one of the wonders of  
the world, on arriving there the eleva-  
tor was used to bring all who wished to  
go down to the lowest flat of that great  
building, 150 ft. from the surface. It  
required some time to bring the party  
to what might be called the "lower  
regions", after explanations given by  
the kind officials, the elevator brought  
the party back again to place of start-  
ing, all well satisfied with the time  
spent in examining that great building  
said to furnish 110,000 horse power.  
The building and plant cost about one  
hundred million dollars. At 4 p. m.  
the party paid a visit to the Prepared  
Food Co's buildings, where they were  
taken to the highest flat of the build-  
ing. They descended by the stairs  
viewing the process of manufacturing  
the Shredded Wheat Biscuit, with which  
they were instructed and delighted.  
The Co. prepared a free lunch for the  
party which was suitable for the Gov-  
ernment-General. I assure you we en-  
joyed this part of the programme. We  
can say that our American cousins  
spared neither time nor money to make  
Canadians at home and happy. The  
party left the Falls about 5 p.m. for  
home. On our way the Pres. called a  
meeting, and as we had two ministers  
on board, speeches were made by them  
and other prominent persons.

Resolutions were passed expressing  
thanks to the Power Co., and the Pre-  
pared Food Co., for their kindness, and  
for the grand reception given them.  
A couple of songs and Auld Land Syne  
were sung, and the meeting wound up  
with God Save the King. The G T R  
train in waiting for those going east,  
where Piper Beeton standing on the  
platform alongside of the train played  
in splendid style, as only he could play  
it, that grand old tune, which is so dear  
to each of us, "Home, Sweet Home."

### MOTHER OF FOUR CHILDREN.

The trustees, secretary, and other  
officers of the Free Hospital for Consump-  
tives at Muskoka are daily in receipt of  
many pious letters.

A few days since Mr. W. J. Gage, of  
Toronto, Chairman of the Executive  
Committee of the National Sanitarium  
Association, received a letter from a  
resident of Quebec, pleading for the ad-  
mission of a victim of the dread white  
plague, living about a hundred miles  
south-east of Montreal, and asking if it  
were not possible to admit her into the  
Free Hospital. The writer says: "The  
applicant is a Mrs. Wm. Paterson, the  
mother of four children and the wife of a  
farmer in a place called Goshen, in the  
township of Windsor. The doctor says  
that her lung only is troubled. She is  
able to go about, but her appetite is  
very bad. I believe if she could be ad-  
mitted into the Free Hospital for Con-  
sumptives she might be cured. She could  
not pay much, if anything. Kindly let  
me know if you could receive her."

We are told by Mr. Gage that applica-  
tions for admission to the Free Hospital  
reach the secretary from all points in the  
Dominion, and 14 persons have been re-  
ceived from Prince Edward Island on the  
west to Alberta on the west. Two  
hundred and twenty-five patients have  
been admitted in eighteen months, and  
not a single patient has been refused  
because of his or her poverty.
