SOUND ADVICE.
Mr. Jacob Y. Shantz Writes to His Nephew From Manitoba—Information That Should be of Use to Immigrants.

Berlin, Ont., Aug. 11.—(Special).—Mr. Jacob T. Shantz, who is now in Manitoba, has written a letter to his nephew, residing near Berlin, Ontario, who has been somewhat carried away by an Alabama fever which certain interested parties have been trying to work up, and is being written from Carman, Man., and is as follows:—

"Dear Nephew,—As trains go only twice a week from here, I have to wait another day, so writing is somewhat of a task. It just comes to my mind what you told me of Alabama. Taking for granted that all is true that you said you saw, in connection with what others told you which could not be seen at the time you were there, I still think there is need of caution. The raising of two or three crops in a year on the same piece of land will certainly take much attention and hard work the year round. Raising and shipping vegetables take close attention, and the watching of the market. Besides, this paying six or eight dollars per acre, and the time taken to take out, manure to be put on the land at the very start, is no small undertaking to do.

"In thinking over the matter I just wish you and Mr. Schaaf would go through this country (Manitoba) and see the crops and the easy way of farming, all work done in about six months of the year; see the progress of the country, the rising of the value of land. Taking all things into consideration, I cannot see how you could decide in favour of Alabama, an old slave State.

"I have been through the Mennoite settlement, which was started eighteen or twenty years ago. Nearly all were poor and had to be helped with a large loan of money which was all paid up seven years ago. Now they are very prosperous. They have the best improved implements, fine horses, large stables, and stocks of horses, cattle, etc., that surprise everybody. Unimproved prairie land in this locality sells at from \$15 to \$20 an acre. Then coming across the country thirty-four miles to Carman, where I am now, it is mostly all settled by Canadians. The crops and land is equally good, though settled only about fourteen years. This is a nice town, with a school with five teachers, five churches, and other things in keeping. Unimproved prairie land around here is worth \$12 to \$20 per acre. I find it about the same throughout the greater part of Manitoba.

"Considering that you can get in the North West Territories, where the land and climate are fully as good, free homesteads with much better conveniences than the first settlers had here, get a comfortable home and have the best of the rising in the value of the land. I cannot see how you could decide for Alabama, the State you mentioned.

SPURIOUS COIN.
A Gang of Counterfeiters in Victoria County.

A WHOLE FAMILY ARRESTED THIS MORNING.
Clever Work of Inspector O'Leary, of Ottawa, aided by County Constables Short and Crawford.

For some weeks past our merchants and bankers have been meeting with considerable quantities of spurious silver coin of 25c. and 10c. denominations, and a suspicion that it was being made in the vicinity of the town became almost a certainty owing to quiet investigations conducted by County Constable Short and Crawford. The Ottawa authorities were then communicated with, and on Friday last Inspector O'Leary, whose special mission is to ferret out counterfeiters, arrived from the capital and registered at the Simpson house under the innocent name of Smith, posing as a commercial man. Next morning he went to work with a will, and taking up the threads of evidence already in the possession of Constables Short and Crawford he followed them up so skillfully that yesterday they felt they had located the guilty parties.

This morning about 2 o'clock Inspector O'Leary and the two constables jumped into a rig in waiting at the Dominion Bank corner and started for the country to arrest the suspected parties. The roads were in a bad condition after the heavy shower that fell an hour previous, but they made fast time, and in about an hour and a half from the time of departure they pulled up within a short distance of a house occupied by a family named Murphy, on the township line between Emily and Manvers, about a mile from Mount Horeb. A little after day-light they approached the house and demanded admission, which was refused, but the door was unsecured, and yielded readily to a little pressure. They then arrested the occupants—Wellington Murphy, Allan Murphy, and Lillie Murphy; William Murphy, whom they were very anxious to secure, was not present, but soon after he came in from the barn and threatened to paralyze all hands, but after a show of force he quietly submitted to Constable Short and allowed himself to be handcuffed.

Acting under authority of the warrant with which they were provided the officers of the law then began a careful search of the premises, and were speedily rewarded by finding a ladle with some melted metal in the bottom, several plaster moulds and other tools for turning out 25c. and 10c. pieces, and a number of coins in the unfinished and complete state, affording indubitable proof that the proper parties had been located.

Murphy, sr., being an old man, and very ill, it was decided not to disturb him, but the other members were brought into town about 10 o'clock, and after a short examination before County Magistrate Deacon they were remanded without bail and lodged in Castle Jackson for safe keeping.

Inspector O'Leary and Constables Short and Crawford deserve credit for the clever way they have handled the affair and the secrecy with which their movements were conducted. The offence is such a serious one that the proof has to be of the most conclusive character, and the slightest whisper would have been fatal to their success.

Inspector O'Leary must be in Winnipeg by Thursday, and will leave town this evening or in the morning, but he says he feels safe in leaving the case in the hands of Constable Short.—Lindsay, Monday evening Post.
