One hundred and twenty-two varieties of winter wheat have been tested at the Ontario Agricultural College within the past six years. Some of these varieties have produced yields of grain E. Not only has there been a great variation in the comparative yields of grain produced by the different varieties, but there has also been a marked difference in strength of straw, weight of grain per measured bushel, value of grain for milling purposes, etc., of the different varieties tested. The results of these experiments are published annually in bulletin torm and in the Cellege report, and are sent free to all members of farmers' institutes in Ontario, by the Department of Agriculture, Toronto.
