Emily Council Proceedings.

OMEMEE, AUG. 3RD, 1896.
Forty-seventh year, eighth session. Council met pursuant to adjournment. Present, all the members, the Reeve in the chair.

The minutes of last session were read and confirmed.

A petition was received from Morgan O'Neill and 24 other resident ratepayers praying that no dog tax be levied on the municipality during the current year. Committee appointed at last session to confer with similar committee from the municipality of Omemee in regard to joint purchase of the respective agricultural lands of an Agricultural Park in the Village of Omemee, as reported verbally.

On motion of Conn. Boate, seconded by Deputy Reeve McQuade, that the petition of Morgan O'Neill and other ratepayers as presented be entertained and that no dog tax be levied in this municipality during the current year and that the Clerk draft a by-law to this effect.

On motion of Deputy Reeve McQuade, that this council do grant the sum of \$400 towards the purchase of an Agricultural Park in the Village of Omemee, conditional upon the municipal council of the said village making a further grant of \$300 for such purpose, the title of such park to be vested in the Omemee and Emily Agricultural Society who will be responsible for same, and that a special privilege in the event of the said society becoming insolvent or defunct, said park shall revert to the municipalities named.—Lost.

Moved in amendment by Conn. Boate, seconded by Conn. Ford, that this council do grant the sum of \$250 towards the purchase of an Agricultural Park in the Village of Omemee, conditional upon the municipal council of the said village do grant an equal amount for such purpose, the title of such park to be invested in the said municipalities, they to subsequently lease or grant the privilege of using same gratuitously, to the Omemee and Emily Agricultural Society for the purpose of an Agricultural Show Ground.—Carried.

On motion of Conn. Boate, sec. by Deputy Reeve McQuade, that the sum of \$600 be levied and collected in this municipality for the current year, that is to say: for County Rate, \$304, General School Rate \$1500, and Township Rate \$1500, and that the Clerk do draft a by-law to this effect.—Carried.

On motion of Conn. Boate, sec. by Conn. Ford, that by-law number 273, for the purpose of non-imposition of dog tax in this municipality during the current year be now introduced and read a first time.—Carried.

On motion of Conn. Boate, sec. by Deputy Reeve McQuade, that the following day be examined and approved bills of paid, viz:

The New Marriage Act.

On the first of August the marriage act was passed at the last session of the local legislature came into force. The act provides that before procuring a marriage license each of the contracting parties shall make an affidavit stating the date on which the ceremony is to be done; that they are each full eighteen years of age, and that there is no legal bar to their marriage. A record of the affidavit will be kept by the issuer of the license, and he will forward to the registrar-general's department the names, ages, occupations and religion of the contracting parties. These new features of the marriage law were added at the suggestion of the ministers, who discussed them pretty fully at their meetings.
