THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS

Are Expected to Take Place This Autumn.

THE FOURTH TUESDAY IN NOVEMBER FIXED FOR ELECTION DAY—MR. TARTE DEPENDS ON TO DO QUIET ELECTIONEERING WORK.

OTTAWA, AUG. 9.—(Special)—It is whispered quietly in well-informed political circles here that Mr. Hardy has definitely decided to dissolve the Ontario Legislature and have the provincial elections this fall. Indeed, the whisper is so definite that your correspondent is told on what he believes to be excellent authority that the exact date has been fixed, and that it is Tuesday, 23rd November. Your correspondent's informant further said that no less a personage than Mr. Tarte would play a very important part in the election, that of the good angel ministering to the wants of doubtful constituencies, in the way of Dominion public works which the wicked Tories would not undertake while they were in office. It is not to be inferred that Mr. Tarte will take any public part in the elections or appear on any platforms with Sir Oliver's late "wicked partner." Mr. Hardy, but his part will be important nevertheless. During this week, probably on Wednesday or Thursday, Mr. Tarte will start on a triumphant tour through Western Ontario in his private car, with a grand retinue of retainers, and attended with all that lavish display which characterized his tour of inspection through Manitoba last year. The object of this new tour is to "inspect" and locate public works, such as new buildings, harbours, breakwaters, etc., in Ontario, and it is by these public works and their distribution "where they will do most good" that he is expected to help his friend Mr. Hardy. —Mail and Empire.

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Bentley's New Scheme.

HE HAS HAD WRITS ISSUED AGAINST ONE HUNDRED TORONTO FIRMS FOR BREACH OF STATUTE.

BRAMPTON, ONT., AUG. 7.—A lawyer from Toronto by name of Bentley came out on this morning's train, and has caused writs to be issued to it of the local High Court here against a hundred of the prominent firms in Toronto failing to comply with the last Ontario statute concerning joint stock companies, which require every limited company to issue a statement on or before the first of February each year showing particulars of stock now held, etc. The penalty for non-compliance with the act is \$20 per day, and the lawyer, on behalf of one Bowler, is suing each one of these for \$1800 penalty. The lawyer's object in serving the writs here was to have them served on Monday, before the parties could find out anything about it. To show how much in earnest the lawyer is, it may be mentioned that he has spent \$110 in law stamps.—Port Hope Guide of Monday.
