As the body came closer to the water it was seen that the parachute had failed to open, apparently because it was entangled with Mrs. Christiansen's clothing. When she struck the water several boats pulled out from the shore to rescue her. When reached she was dead.—Mail and Empire.

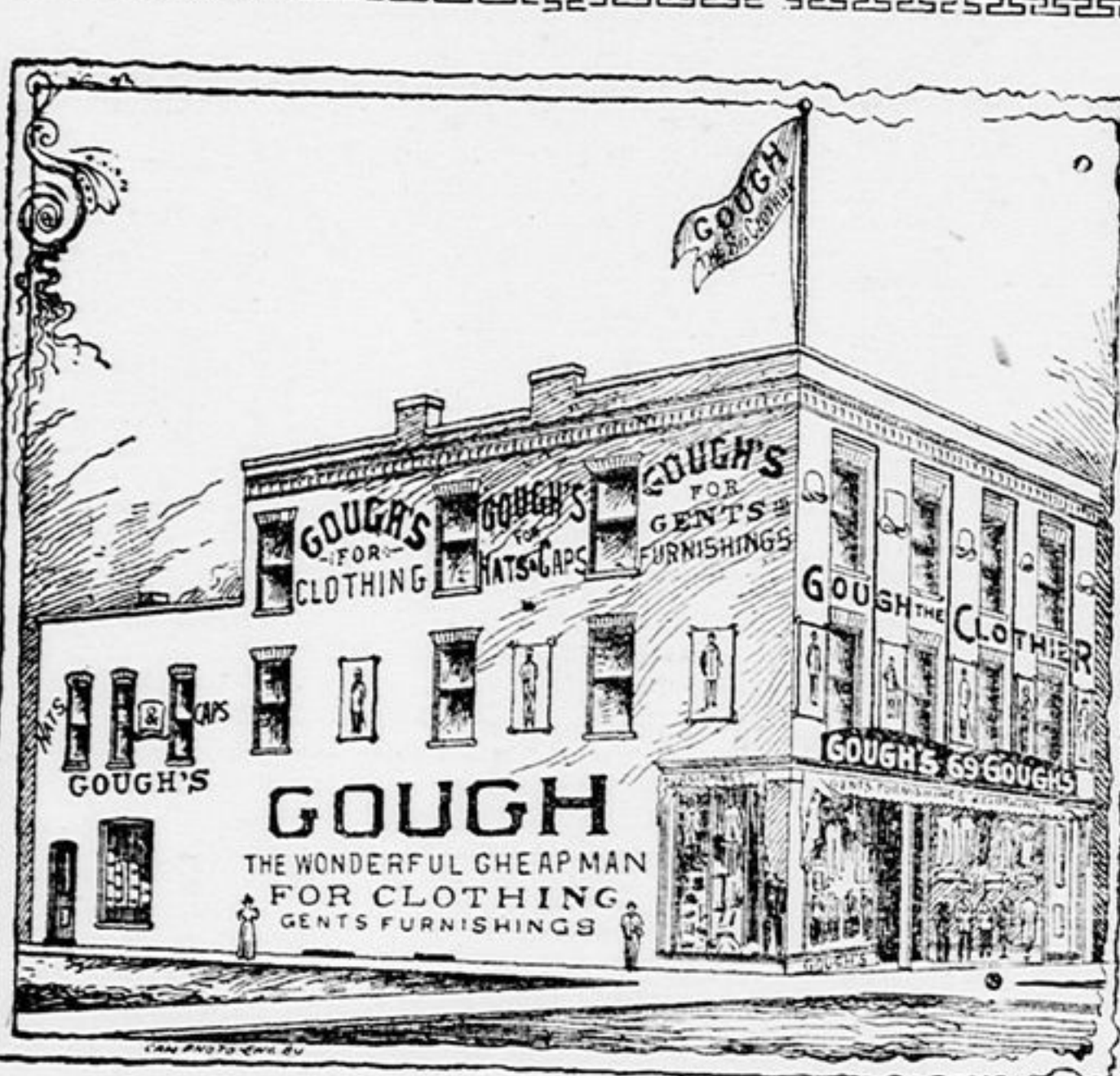
