HAD HIS WRIST INJURED.

MAILS WERE CAPTURED.

THE NATIVES' DANCE.

THEY SHOOK THE GROUND.

Florida, May 31st, 1900.

DEAR MOTHER.—I have written you every opportunity since leaving Bloomfontein. No news has reached the R. C. R. since that time. We have had hard work and plenty of fighting since same time. I have a very sore wrist and will not write much. Hcpe war will be over very soon now. The battle of the Rand which closed night before last was a hot one. R. C. R. had 7 wounded. The Gordon Highlanders made two splendid charges and their loss was heavy. The Boers had splendid shelter behind rocks. It was among these rocks I saw the first dead of the enemy. This is 7 miles from Johannesburg, and we hear that Roberts has taken it. Hoping that you are all well and that I soon hear from home.

P. S. 4 p.m. We were congratulated through our officers for the work done by the Hamilton forces, by Lord Roberts. He regretted we could not be present to enter Johannesburg, the surrender of which he expected this morning. He also regretted we had not our proper rations and we were pleased to hear that he had despatched a train load for us. Corn meal, meat, tea and cocoa, fills our bill of fare for the present.

Springs, June 19, 1900.

DEAR MOTHER, I last wrote you on the last day of May, from Florida. Mail matters have not been very satisfactory since we left Bloomfontein. I believe a lot of incoming mail has been captured and there have not been many opportunities for posting. From Florida we moved outside Johannesburg which only a few had the chance of seeing, from there we moved to Pretoria. We were in reserve at the bombardment of the forts. The Boers slid away in the night and British marched in the morning. The R. C. R. marched through the city on three different days. I saw Lord Roberts standing in the little lawn in front of your residence. It is very unpretentious all plain barring the lions. From Pretoria we went to Irene than to Elandfontein then here. This is a coal mining place. British killed 60 Boers and a section of Royal Horse Artillery here. There were some Boers sniping when we came here but now all is quiet. A good many handing in arms, one from Lings Nek came in last night and says 50 more would come in only they are afraid of being sent to St. Helena. This is a very good place for coal and water. The men are quartered in the round house and officers in cottages. It is reported that Capt. Blanchard was killed and Capt. Macdonald captured when our mail was lost. I wish the necessity of writing was over. I hope we are not kept in South Africa much longer for it would be running in the nasty fall weather to write anyway. I am to have suit about all I have to say. My wrist is nearly well and I feel first rate. Remember me to all.

DEAR CLIFFORD.—I saw a great dance this

afternoon, given by the natives. You would have enjoyed it very much I am sure. They had lots of togety, but were not very well or warmly clad. There were 3 sets and 400 dancers. Drums made of barrels and cylinders; pianos made of boxes with pieces of wood strung over the top. These they play with a pair of sticks, and there is quite a variety of tones in them. The dancers had shields on their chests which they flourished. The orchestra and dancers kept good time and when they would play and dance they would shake the ground. It was the most savage exhibition I ever saw. I am enclosing a stamp for you. Hope I will be home before a great while to tell you all you wish to know.

Springs, June 28th, 1900.

DEAR ELLA.—Yesterday I got yours of April 28th. Also Montreal Star, Fernmanah Times and Orilla Packet reached me. This is the first budget since April 21st, and you may be sure they were more than welcome. I had the reading of the Watchman-Ward and Evening Post from Mr. Matthews. Hope we get our mail regular now. When we came here we camped in the open, then moved into the round house, and now occupy the Springs Hotel, and I am now doing garrison duty. Beside the R. C. R. now there is one section of Royal Horse Artillery here. Outposts, patrols and guards make the duties pretty heavy to us. The remainder of the regiment is scattered all about the country. There are two mounted troops, artillery and the 1st Royal Infantry, all under Jan Hamilton, passed South. In one of my former letters I mentioned Norman Wilson, who is still on the Hospital Corps and looks well. They call him the Cuban Wonder. Mail closes at 4.30. I am taking first chance of advising you of re-opening of communication.
