

The official despatches from the United States have, unhappily, not been marked by diplomatic courtesy. In respect of Venezuela, Wasi ington laid down the doctrine-a sort of extension of the Monroe principlethat it had the right to exercise supervision over British interests on this contineut. It indeed went further, and hinted pretty broadly that Great Britain, the Empire with which we in Canada choose to east our lot, ought to vacate this particular portion of the earth's surface. One cannot but admire the moderation which Lord Salisbury met these astounding propositions. The audacious claims to the ownership of a part of the ocean, and to the right to treat British vessels on that ocean as the Washington statesmen might think desirable or prudent. It is true that the Paris award knocked this pretention endways; but it lingers, and we see its effect in Secretary Sherman's remarkable note, in which he talked violently of England's failure to enforce United States claims, which the Paris tribunal had pronounced invalid. The fact is the people of the United States stand essentially for business. They are strikingly similar to the Dutch, of whom it was said that they gave too much. We see their peculiarity in their treatment of all tariff matters. They accept the freedom of the British market, which is essential to their very existence, and rule out by their legislation the products of Great Behring Sea controversy opened with Britain and of her possessions. 
