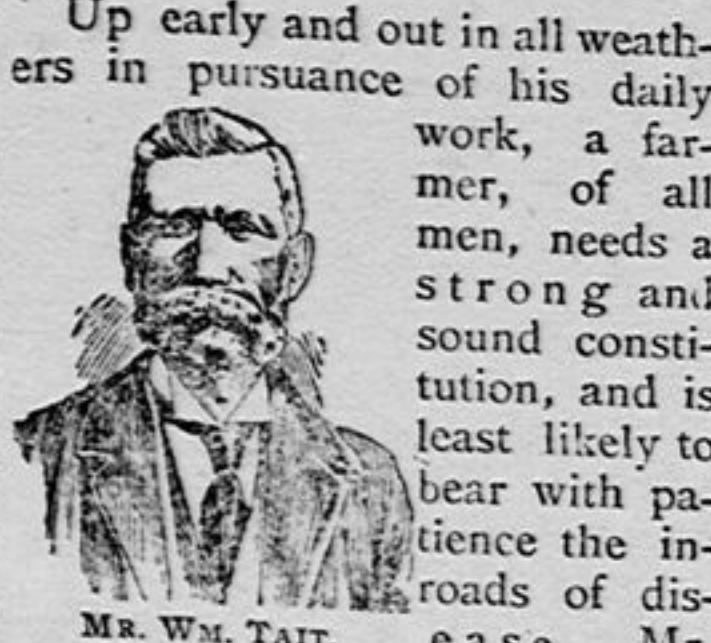

VICTORIA CHEESE BOARD.

It is not likely that any factory representative in attendance at the regular meeting of Victoria County Cheese board yesterday went there expecting to receive the phenomenal price paid at last board sale, but it was plain to all observers that the salesmen had settled among themselves that 10 1-2c. would be the proper caper for the buyers. The latter held a different view, however.

President Thos. Robertson and the other officers were present. The buyers were Messrs. Whitton, Fitzgerald and Flavelle.

The Unucky Reporters. Before bidding started Mr. Whitton, buyer for Dealer Watkins, of Belleville, called attention to several errors in the newspaper reports of last board meeting. Instancing that Mr. Fitzgerald, buyer for Hodgson Bros., Montreal, had been credited with a purchase made by Mr. Flavelle. Other small errors frequently crept into the reports, and he

Bidding Brisk to a Point. Mr. Whitton opened with a bid of 10c. Mr. Fitzgerald raised a sixteenth, Mr. Whitton made his offer 10 1-8c. and Mr. Flavelle, as at last board, again led the procession by calling 10 1-4c. After a considerable wait this was not bettered and he called Cameron, Cambray, Pine Grove, Fenelon Falls and Palestine (the latter subject to Lindsay inspection). The two first-named factories refused, leaving Mr. F. with a total of 217 boxes.

For the second selection Mr. Fitzgerald called 10 1-4c., and Mr. Whitton made the same offer a second later. As President Robertson thought the offers had been made simultaneously he urged that the difficulty would be for one of the buyers to increase his bid, but his well-meant advice was not taken. Finally the two buyers agreed to call factory in turn, but after each had named five factories without securing any takers they decided to abandon the plan.

Buyer Whitton—"Well, men, you may possibly think that we are offering too low a price, but if you had watched the papers you wouldn't hold that opinion. At Brockville Saturday cheese sold for less than we offer, taking the difference of freight into consideration. Napanee markets only went 10 1-2c. on Friday."

President Robertson—"Well I expected that we would get about 10 1-2c. to-day."

Mr. W. Flavelle—"The English markets will not respond to the high prices paid on this side, and the cable is not at all encouraging."

Mr. Fitzgerald then repeated his offer of 10 1-4c. and called Star, Dunsford, North Ops, Mariposa, and Oakwood; the three first-named accepted.

Mr. Whitton made the same bid for Red Rock, Maple Leaf, Bobaygaon, Reaboro and Omemeé, all accepting. Total 656 boxes.

Mr. Flavelle took Cameron, Oakwood North Verulam (subject to Lindsay inspection) and Janetville, leaving Mariposa the only factory unsold, but we understand Mr. Fitzgerald took the lot later at 10 1-4c.

The board then adjourned to meet again on Monday, Sept. 10th.
