PRESIDENT MCKINLEY SHOT
The Attempted but Frustrated
Assassination of the Presi-
dent, on Friday Last

At Pan-American Exposition Buffalo.

The attempt upon the life of the President of the United States struck this land with consternation. We are profoundly grateful that there is a fair prospect of his recovery. We devoutly hope that his life will be spared. It will be a great loss to the civilized world for such a man as McKinley to fall in the prime of manhood, and come of his usefulness.

We are profoundly sorry to be assured that this dastardly and infamous act was perpetrated under the inspiration of an organized confederacy. We had hoped that it would turn out to be the foolhardiness of an idiot, or the wicked imbecility of a crank. It is appalling to think that the United States is not free enough for these murderous conspirators against all organized authority. The desperate character of a federation that could plan their villainy against the country that has received them into its life, and thrown around them the aegis of its protection, is alarmingly significant. When such villainy can be deliberately planned, not merely against Governments which are monarchical and oppressive, but against those in which the highest freedom may be enjoyed, not merely against tyrants and vipers, but against men who represent the noblest principles of righteousness, and are themselves distinguished for their virtuous living and high ideals, it is time the whole civilized world should awake to its enormity.

It is to be hoped that the United States will learn by this occurrence that the liberty of the individual does not mean the toleration of the meanest and basest criminals; and that she will adopt measures that shall be effective in utterly crushing them out of her life. The land of the free should be made as uncomfortable a place for conspirators of this calibre to flourish as the most despot countries of the old world.

I Am Not Alone; I Did My Duty.
CONFESSION BY CZOLGOSZ.
I am an Anarchist. I do not believe in the American form of government. My faith in this Government was destroyed by Emma Goldman, whom I heard deliver lectures in New York a few years ago, and with whom I have since been in correspondence. I believe that any man who accepts the Presidency is a foe to the common people. He represents only the class of oppressors.

I did my duty. I am sorry that Mr. McKinley has suffered. I intended to kill him, and I regret that I did not succeed.

I hope no one will mistake my position. I am not a common assassin. Personally, I had little to gain as a result of this act. The shot that I fired was for the benefit of all mankind. I intended to kill the President of the United States. Against Mr. McKinley as a man I could have no feeling. I have been told that he is a good man. I did not wish to inflict suffering upon his family, but in accomplishing my purpose I could not consider them. I say again that I did not assassinate the man. I intended to kill the President, because I believed it would have a good effect upon the country and upon all mankind.

I will not say whether anyone had the knowledge of my plans. This much the authorities of this country must know:—I am not alone in this work. I am only one of the great body of Anarchists bound together under solemn oath to accomplish a work and to bring about the results that surely must come.

My plans were all carefully laid. I had failed on other occasions, but when I heard that President McKinley would have a public reception I knew that fortune had thrown my opportunity in my way.

After studying the matter over I decided that I would attempt to kill the President while he was in Buffalo. Therefore I came to the Pan-American Exposition, and for the last three days I have planned carefully my attack upon him. With the 32-caliber revolver I had practised frequently in wrapping my handkerchief about my right hand so that the weapon was concealed in the palm, while its protruding muzzle might be taken to be my thumb.

I am not sorry for what I have done. Why should I be? I have been simply an agent in the accomplishment of a work which I

hope will succeed. Of course, I know that, as it is now constituted, the Government possesses the power to punish, and I know that the great majority are still too ignorant to appreciate that I have struck a blow for liberty.

I shall be denounced, and I will be punished, but I will take my punishment, no matter in what form it may come, like a man.

Asks Prayers of Catholics.
Halifax, N. S., Sept. 8.—Archbishop O'Brien today asked prayers of Catholics throughout the Diocese of Halifax for the temporal and spiritual welfare of President McKinley and for his recovery. He attributed the crime of his attempted assassination to the growing infidelity of the world to the lack of parental control over children, and to the increasing power and recklessness of human life of great industrial communities.

FROM KING AND KAISER.
Personal Messages of Sympathy Addressed to McKinley.
Buffalo, Sept. 8.—The following are copies of personal messages, received from King Edward and Emperor William:—
Kiel, Sept. 7.
President United States, Buffalo, America:
Am horrified beyond words at that dastardly attempt on your life. My best and warmest good wishes and most earnest hopes for your recovery.
EDWARD R. KOENIGSBERG, Sept. 6.
President of the United States, Buffalo, America:—
Deeply distressed by the news of the dastardly attempt upon your life. I express to you how I and the whole of the German people feel for you, and for the anguish through which your country has to pass. May the Lord grant you a sure and speedy recovery.
WILLIAM R. I. HAMILTON, Sept. 8.—In nearly every church in the city to-day prayers were offered up for the speedy recovery of President McKinley. Bishop Dumoulin instructed the clergy of the Anglican churches not to forget the President in the prayers of the Church. Many of the clergy chose as subjects of their discourses the assassination of the President.

Canadian Nurse.
BROCKVILLE YOUNG LADY WAITING ON MCKINLEY.
Brockville, Ont., Sept. 8.—The attempted assassination of President McKinley at Buffalo has more than passing interest in Brockville as Miss Maud Mohan, the nurse in charge of the President, is a Brockville young lady. Miss Mohan only left here Friday at noon, after spending a three weeks' holiday with her mother, Mrs. R. Mohan. On reaching Buffalo Friday night a carriage was in waiting to convey her to the Milburn residence, to which President McKinley had been removed.

Seeks Refuge in Montreal.
Montreal, Sept. 8.—Advices received from New York at a late hour to-night state that Emma Goldman, the notorious Anarchist, is on her way to Montreal, if not already here. She is coming to Montreal, it is stated, to evade arrest for alleged complicity in the shooting of President McKinley.

One should think that hereafter the United States will adopt stricter measures regarding Anarchists. Hitherto America has been looked upon as the asylum and dumping ground of bad elements of any Country. And thus it is that the Anarchists have dared to be quite public with their propaganda. Unfortunately the laws of the country do not provide for the punishment of the advocates of Anarchy in spreading their murderous doctrines. But it is hoped that from this forth the United States will change this tolerant attitude and adopt the measures of the other powers to stamp out this evil. The attempt to assassinate an European Ruler is high treason and punishable by death no matter whether the attempt is successful or not. In U. S. however it is not even an offence against the Government and can only be treated as a crime against an individual. The highest punishment in case of recovery of the victim, can only be ten years imprisonment. Rev. Dr. Talmage has become a convert to Lynch-law, and, considering the circumstances in this case, one cannot wonder at it, and the sooner these Anarchists are done away with, the better, whether by lynching, hanging, or burning, it matters not, so long as they are wiped off the face of the earth.

There has been a good deal of comment at the refusal of the Ecumenical Methodist Conference to listen to letters from the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of London welcoming the gathering and expressing the hope that the Methodists will yet be reunited with their parent Church. After all there is really very little the matter. The communications were not formally received for the reason that they were not addressed to the conference, but to the editor of a religious newspaper. Obviously, therefore, they were not intended by the writers to be read to the conference, but for publication. The mistake was in attempting to present the letters to the conference. Had this been allowed it would have called for a

reply, and it is not customary for a dignified body to send an answer to a document not addressed to it. The incident is regrettable, chiefly because it may be misunderstood. We may be sure that neither the writers of the letters nor the conference intend ed any disrespect for each other.
