SOLID BASIS FOR ART.

Mr. Sherwood Favors an International Society.

To Broaden the Horizon—Art in Canada Now in a Transition State—Forecast as to Its Future.

The importance of broadening the horizon of art as of literature cannot be too strongly emphasized" said Mr. W. A. Sherwood in an interview with the Free Press and day "particularly in a young and impressionable country like Canada."

It is in the inception that the utmost care should be taken, for we know how difficult a thing it is to eradicate from the soil an ill planted weed or even, an ediable perennial:

Art in Canada is really in a transition state and reflecting the work in some measure of the French schools.

There is little English or German art feeling in our country. We speak of being English and yet we have little that is genuinely British in art. "Our educational institutions are literally closed to the most accomplished scholars at Oxford or Cambridge; Provincial enactments prevent any chance of place being open to the reception in Collegiate institutes of even a double degree Master of Oxford.

"We are mistaking provincialism, for patriotism and are zealous in the carrying out of our work.

"I have always advocated a national spirit in art, both in the press and upon the platform. This has had, I am sorry to say, a very unfortunate effect resulting in a most appalling state of provincialism. The error I committed was in not having instituted an art association in the Capital rather than in the Provincial capital of Toronto.

"I know, however, that a very large number of cultured citizens of Toronto are one with me on the necessity of establishing an International Society of Art, looking to a healthier and more solid basis for our own as the result.

"Your editorial upon the subject which I read the other day was most apropos and cannot fail to produce good results. It lies with the press of Canada to mould public opinion along the aesthetic as well as on political and economic lines.—Ottawa Free Press of Saturday.
