THE EMILY FALL FAIR.

One of the Most Successful Held in Many Years.

THE EXHIBITS WERE SUPERIOR TO ANY IN FORMER YEARS.

The Attendance Larger and the Special Attractions Better.

The Emily Agricultural Society held their annual fall fair in Omeme, on Monday and Tuesday, October 1st and 2nd, when one of the best fall shows which has been held here for many years was given.

Turner arrived from Peterborough and erected tents for the members to show their exhibits in. A quantity of roots, grain, etc., were brought in on the first day, but the majority of the exhibits came in on the forenoon of the second day.

The weather was all that could have been desired, and the town presented a lively appearance on Tuesday. The display of roots, grain and vegetables was exceptionally fine and the improvement in these lines over former years was very marked.

The department allotted to ladies work was one of the greatest attractions of the fair and the work as all displayed in good style, which showed the artistic skill the ladies in Emily and Omeme have.

In dairy products, several fine qualities of butter were shown, as well as some splendid cheese, shown by J. Brown. The fruit display was fair.

T. H. Wilson, patent medicine vendor of Brockton, Ont., offered a special prize for the largest size hen eggs. The display of hen fruit was exceptionally large, the first prize being given to E. C. Williamson, and 2nd to J. Deyell.

The farmers in this township are noted for keeping some of the best horses in the country, and the entries in all the different classes were splendid, and every animal exhibited was one of which its owner might well feel proud.

The prizes in this contest were hotly contested and it was hard work for the judges to tell where to place the red tickle.

The cattle, sheep and swine entries were somewhat small and should have been larger for such a township as Emily.

The drawing match was the chief attraction on the grounds, and some magnificent teams were entered for this contest. Four teams made entries: P. Callahan's team, drew 15 feet 1 1/2 inches; Geo. Deyell's team, 8 feet 5 1/2 inches; T. Walker's team, 3 feet 9 inches. The load was 7,000 pounds and the sheeps 700 pounds more. The greatest interest was manifested in this event, and the best of order prevailed.

The b.b. show had only two entries, but still with this the judges had some hard work which to decide on, but finally awarded first to Mrs. T. H. McQuade, and 2nd to J. Deyell.

The contest for lady drivers brought out a strong field, and the final contest lay between Mrs. Cunningham, Miss Pratt and Mrs. Isaac Fee, and the tickets so placed.

The speeding in the ring did not take place, owing to some misunderstanding.

Among the list of special attractions was that of the prettiest girl on show grounds, under 14 years, the prize was awarded to Miss Beatrice Hickson, Kenora, and the prettiest unmarried lady on show grounds, under 25 years, the prize was given to Miss Maye Laidley, daughter of T. B. Laidley, west of Omeme.
