Mr. McMillan, of Lindsay, will conduct the afternoon service. Special collections in aid of the building fund. A hearty invitation is extended to all.

The Methodist church at Franklin was re-opened last Sunday and Monday the 15th & 16th of Oct., after having been closed for some weeks for the purpose of repairs. Special Sermons were preached on Sunday by Rev. E. Roberts of Omemeo who simply delighted the people with his excellent discourse. The collections amounted to \$14.50. On Monday evening an excellent tea was served when the sum of \$50.00 was realized, a good programme of readings, recitations, addresses and music was furnished by the Misses Edna Stewart and Annie Herbert and Adie Staples, Revs. E. W. Morgan and C. H. Coon and the Ebenezer, and Franklin Church choirs. The re-opening as a whole was a very table success. The church in its new dress of paper and paint looks very nice and the total cost of improvements \$107.00, is fully met.

Some time ago Rev. Norman H. Russell delivered a missionary address in the Omemeo Presbyterian Church, and after showing the great need for christian work in Central India, those present agreed, in behalf of the church, to support a native missionary. The man chosen was Bleika, and those who are engaged in the laudible work of supporting him as their representative in the foreign field will be interested in the story of his life.

The Story of Bleika.

Most of the native preachers working in our Central India Mission are from outside of Central India, having been either converted in other missions or are the children of christians in other parts of India. Bleika has this advantage that he belongs to the country in which he is laboring, being a native of the beautiful valley of Neeimar in the southern part of C. India.

Some six years ago or more a man named Nannu was travelling home from a pilgrimage to Northern India when at one of the railway stations of our mission he was persuaded to buy a tract. Through this little book on Christianity he became more or less interested in religion. His village was near to one of our Mission outstations named Barwai and in due course our native preachers reached him with their gospel message. He proved a ready listener and from being merely interested he soon became convinced, and applied for baptism. It was a happy day for us when we received this the first convert in the Nimar valley into the fold of Christ. He soon proved his faith and earnestness by interesting a number of others in the truth. He had abundant opportunity, for his trade was that of drum player and it took him into all parts of the country. Among those who, through his witness became applicants for baptism, was his brother-in-law, Bleika, a fine, earnest young man, who in due course was received into our christian community.

Some months after his baptism I happened to be spending a few days in Barwai, and Bleika came to see me. He begged of me that I would teach him to read that he might for himself read the bible and preach it to his fellows. I pointed out to him the difficulties. He was a married man, far beyond school years, did not know a letter of the alphabet, had no habits of study. He would be obliged to leave home and come to school, to go to school like a boy, and live very plainly until he was able to help himself. All these difficulties, however, did not move him from his purpose. He said he did not fear the work or the humiliation or the loss it only he could learn to read and explain the Bible.

Such an appeal I could not resist, but I determined to try him. I put him into the a b c class with boys of 5 and 6 to learn his alphabet. Nothing daunted, he set steadily to work and soon mastered his letters. Often would I see a light burning far into the night in Bleika's house and I could hear him spelling out the words of the Bible or see him writing them on his slate.

In due time he had progressed far enough to be allowed to attend our Presbytery's classes for training workers in the bible and christian knowledge. Here also he displayed great zeal. Within 3 years from the time he began to read he had passed an examination in Genesis, Exodus, the 4 gospels, in the refutation of Hinduism, and Astronomy, and with such success as to be awarded a prize.

Since then Bleika has been hard at work as a Bible reader, part of the time in Mhow and part in Maupur, another of our outstations. Some two years ago he was elected a Deacon of the church. He is a good, faithful, earnest man, and seeking to live to God's glory. At present he is away visiting his old home and companions, and taking opportunity to tell them of Jesus. Bleika is a bright, eager speaker, and very friendly, winning his way to the favour of many.

In helping him in this grand work you are sowing seed in good ground, for will it be long, I trust, before you will see much fruit. May the prayers of all God's people go up for him and the needy multitudes of dark India.
