If the operators consider the proposition unacceptable, the miners are willing to arbitrate the questions at issue. It was also decided to continue the strike until the opertors agree to the convention's pro-

Whereas they have failed to specify the length of time this advance would remain in force, and have also failed to abolish the sliding scale method of determining wages; we would recommend: That this convention accept an adrance of 10 per cent, provided the operators will continue its payment until April 1, 1901, and will abolish the sliding scale in the Lehigh and Schnylkill regions, the scale of wages in the two last-named districts to remain stationary at 10 per cent, above the present basis price: and that the companies will agree to adjust other grievances complained of with committees of their
